Czechs Crack Down On Barber Services

Munich, Germany—(U.P.)—Czech barbers, now employees of the Communist state, are under orders Wednesday to give only the basic service in shaving, trimming a beard or cutting the hair of a customer.

Radio Free Europe reported Czech barbers are forbidden to give scalp massages, wash hair, apply lotion or keep razors for special customers.

The broadcast said the special services were called reminders of the "servile, bourgeois days," by the Czech government.

L. A. Hotel Blaze Takes Seventh Victim

Los Angeles—(U.P.)—Emil Monge, 29, Tuesday night became the seventh victim of a flash fire that raced through the top three floors of a Los Angeles "skid row" hotel seriously injuring nine other persons.

Monge suffered first, second and third degree burns over most of his body. He died in general hospital more than 12 hours after the blaze swept through the St. George hotel before dawn Tuesday.

Five residents, all men, died in the fire.

Wood Waste Power Symington Seeks Seat From Missouri Said To Be Near

Seattle—The lumber industry's dream of generating enough power from waste wood to run its sawmills came a lot closer to reality today with the announcement here that combustion efficiencies of 92.5 to 99 per cent have been obtained with a sawdust-fed gas turbine developed at the Oregon Forest Products Laboratory of Corvallis, Ore.

Heat release rates up to 900,000 Btu per square foot-hour based on grate area and 200,000 Btu per cubic foot-hour based on furnace volume were realized in the laboratory furnace, George H. Atherton and Stanley E. Corder, mechanical engineers with the laboratory, said. Their joint paper was presented at the spring meeting of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers at the University of Washington.

Based on grate area, it was reported, this heat release is about three times as high as that attained in most sawmill installations producing steam from hogged fuel. Based on furnace volume, the heat release rate is about 15 times as great as that usually attained in most boiler installations using wood fuel, it was pointed out. The objective of the laboratory's project is to develop firing equipment for a gas turbine power unit that will serve as a source of power in sawmills and use wood waste as fuel.
