

Seniors Defeat Juniors 53-46 In Tubby Dean Memorial Game; Merchant Tilt Pleases Crowd

A big crowd of fans was treated to a rip-roaring game of basketball and to another skirmish that vaguely resembled the hoop sport as the American Legion post of Medford presented its A. Z. (Tubby) Dean Memorial maplecourt program last night at the senior high.

And, take it from Legionnaires, the whole project was a howling success. The Dean Memorial electric scoreboard for the senior high football field has been assured, along with its installation and possibly a plaque. Funds for the purchase of the board were provided by the sale of shares which also admitted buyers to last night's contests.

Fans, too, got their money's worth in entertainment. They saw the Seniors of the high school uphold their dignity and prestige with a 53 to 46 decision over the Juniors and they saw a comic encounter between the west and east side merchants in which the "home" team beat the "visitors" 36 to 35 but no one bothered to explain which was the home quint and which was the visitor. Both teams claimed a moral victory.

Fray Confusing
In the merchants battle the west side drove toward the east basket and the east toward the

west goal. Just to make it a bit more confusing, lead in the game changed hands frequently without a basket being made. The scoreboard, not the teams, went on a rampage.

There were occasionally three or four balls on the floor at one time and one of them was a lopsided beach ball. The latter ball was a bit unmanageable, but, then, the players had a bit of trouble managing themselves.

The west side Mexicans came out on the floor dressed for the most part in colorful Mexican style and wore south-of-the-border straw hats. Among the exceptions George Barr looked like a hayseed and Joe Hosick had on a derby. Coach Paul Hayiland, the district attorney, who subbed for Bill Gates, made the most of the opportunity to do a bit of political campaigning with sandwich boards.

The east side had a wide assortment of costumes. Among them were Martin May in a football outfit, Vic David with false and Jack Peters with a baseball cap and bright red pajama pants.

Seniors Roar
The Seniors roared from behind in the final quarter to win going away. They went into the period trailing 36 to 34 but gained a quick lead of 38 to 36 on buckets by Justin Smith and Jack Boardman. Ned Landers of the Juniors canned two from the field to put his crew back on top 40 to 38. Boardman tied up the game but Dick Atterbury gave the Juniors a 42 to 40 advantage.

Dennis Conner flipped in a free throw. Then Boardman came through from the field to make the score 43 to 42 for the Seniors. From that point the Seniors ran up a 51 to 42 margin and were well out of danger in the closing seconds.

It was, nevertheless, a hard-earned triumph for the "older boys." The Seniors hopped to edges of 5 to 0 and 7 to 2 in the opening stanza but the Juniors rallied and went on top 13 to 11 by the quarter horn. With the score 11-all and seconds flying by the Seniors elected to take the ball out of bounds instead of shooting a free shot. But the ball was promptly pilfered and Dick Atterbury tossed in a goal with scant seconds left in the period.

Boardman Sparks
Boardman burst out in the second quarter for 10 points to

lead the Seniors to a 29 to 20 halftime spread. Don Spinas got four points and Justin Smith and Conner two each in the drive.

The Juniors staged a spirited comeback in the third quarter and it appeared their hard-running tactics might give them the decision. Two free heaves by Nick Smith made the count 31 to 20 for the Seniors. Then the Juniors unwound. Ned Landers got six of their points as they went ahead 32 to 31.

Derald Wooton hit from the field and sank a free shot for a 34 to 32 Senior lead. Ned Landers knotted the fracas. A pair of gift throws by Roland Thompson gave the Juniors the lead by the third period intermission.

Ned Landers Scores 19
Boardman was the big gun of the Seniors with 18 points. He and Derald Wooton were strong under the backboards and Justin Smith did some valuable ball retrieving, particularly in the final canto. Ned Landers scored 19 for the Juniors.

The scuffle was a crowd-pleaser all the way, as the enthusiastic rooting of the sizable audience indicated.

At halftime Mayor Diamond Flynn sealed a book containing the names of shareholders in the scoreboard project in a metal box. It is planned to place the box in the cornerstone for the scoreboard.

Following the fracas Project Chairman Bud Fisher praised merchants for their spirit of cooperation which made the scoreboard drive successful.

Teamsters' Strike Enters Third Day at Hanford Plant

Richland, Wash. — (U.P.) — A wildcat teamsters' strike entered its third day at the vital Hanford atomic works Thursday, and union and management officials alike blasted the walkout as a hazard to the defense effort and a violation of a work contract.

Others Laid Off
About 500 AFL Teamsters Union members continued to stay off the job, and as a result 5,400 other employees were laid off because transportation to take them to their jobs was unavailable.

"There is no justification for this strike," Plant Manager David F. Shaw said. "It is injurious to Hanford's \$180,000,000 expansion program and therefore of serious consequence to the national defense."

Union officials said Dave Beck, executive vice president of the teamsters, had informed them the strike had no justification.

"The action is a clear-cut violation of our contract," Beck said.

'Belgium' Role Given SOC at UN Conclave

Ashland — Southern Oregon college will represent Belgium at the model United Nations convention to be held at the University of Southern California, it was announced today by Pete Soderlund, Medford, chairman of the 11-man SOC delegation.

The assembly meeting will be held at Los Angeles next week with 60 West Coast colleges taking the part of the present UN members.

Soderlund said the Southern Oregon group will serve on the economic and social council while representing Belgium. One of the delegation will appear in native Belgian dress while arguing the cause of that country.

The opening session of the meeting will be addressed by Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt who will be making her first public appearance following her around-the-world return home from the recent Paris meetings. She will give her impression of the fight for human rights as she has observed it in the UN and throughout the world.

Dr. Elmo N. Stevenson, president of SOC, is one of 30 college presidents sponsoring the model UN conference.

13 Persons Hurt In Train Mishap

Winnemucca, Nev. — (U.P.) — Thirteen persons were treated for minor injuries Thursday after a landslide derailed the locomotive and three cars of the Western Pacific California Zephyr.

The accident happened last night as the streamliner was going through a cut in a remote and hilly part of the desert about 40 miles west of Winnemucca.

Aboard the train were 149 passengers and 31 crewmen. The injured were treated by Dr. James A. Callaghan of Winnemucca, who said they suffered "multiple minor injuries."

Tons of storm-loosened earth slid onto the tracks, tipping the locomotive and baggage car to a 45-degree angle. The Western Pacific said two coaches also were derailed.

UN Planes Blast Mig Alley Targets

Seoul, Korea — (U.P.) — United Nations fighter-bombers attacked scattered targets along Korea's "Mig Alley" Thursday without sighting enemy MIG-15 jet interceptors.

Earlier in the morning, American B-26 light bombers raced a storm front moving into Korea from Manchuria to bomb the Suchon and Uden station marshalling yards.

Pilots of two B-26 invader bomb wings reported the Suchon marshalling yard was left "a torn, twisted mass of rails, ties and burning buildings." The Reds have attempted for four days to rebuild the vital rail lines.

Along the thawing battlefield, UN soldiers fought brief patrol actions in the eastern and western sectors of the line.

SOC Registration Now Totals 468

Ashland — Registration latecomers at Southern Oregon college yesterday swelled spring term enrollment to 468 students, it was reported this morning by Mrs. Mabel W. Winston, registrar. She added that by April 7, registration closing date, it is expected that total enrollment will be near the winter quarter figure of 600.

Tonight's evening class will be folk dancing taught by Beverly Bennett, instructor in physical education. The class will convene in Memorial court at 7:30 p. m. and interested townspeople are advised that they may register at that time.

The third in a series of graduate courses offered on Saturday mornings will have its first session March 29. Dr. Bill Sampson, assistant professor of edu-

cation, will teach school finance. The class is one of four required for elementary principal credentials.

Mrs. Winston said openings are still available in Monday evening night classes in vocal music lessons, orchestra, school organization and law, and contemporary novel.

Dayton, Wash. — (U.P.) — Marion J. Lowe, 25-year-old farm worker, was killed Wednesday when a farm tractor he was operating overturned and pinned him underneath.

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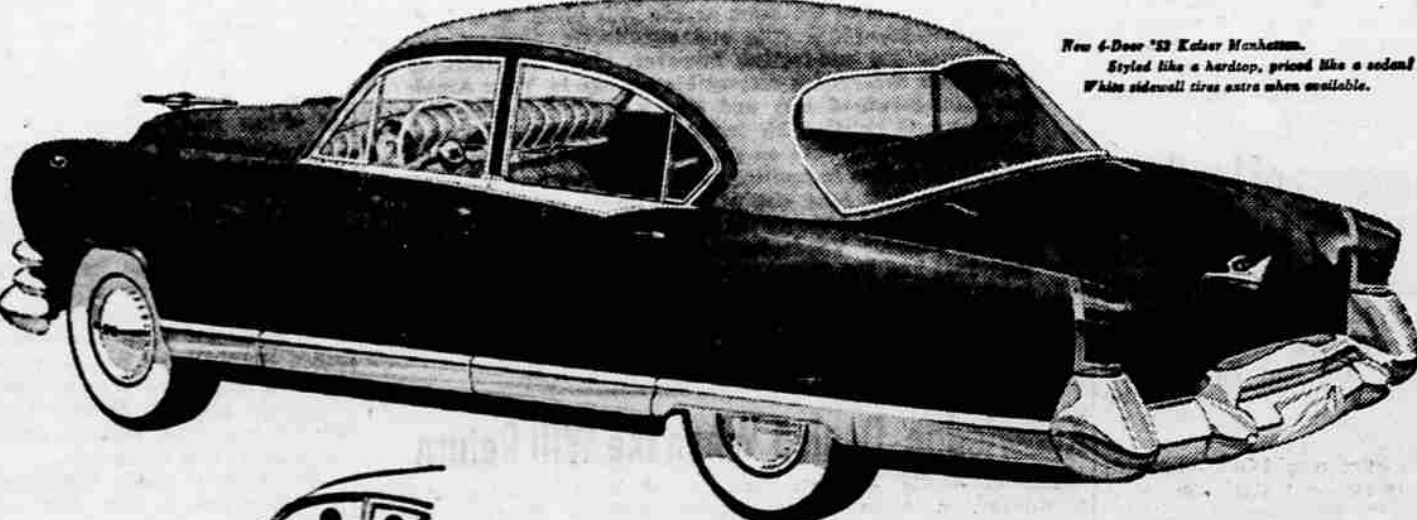
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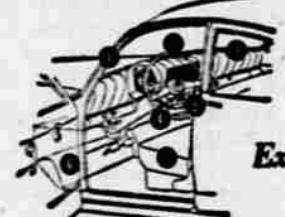
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
