IS A 'HOME OF THEIR OWN' ESSENTIAL TO HAPPINESS?

One of the dreams of a young couple is to have a home of their own where they can be off by themselves, away from any possible interference from family or friends. But is this essential to happiness? That is the question raised by the following letter from a disturbed and worried mother:

(Q) "Our daughter of 18 is going to marry an only child of 23. Although she has paid for nearly half the furniture, she tells me they are going to live with his folks. She says he doesn't want to rent a place as that is 'throwing away money'. He hasn't one cent saved although he has worked since he was 15 and has never paid board. Together they earn enough to have a place of their own but she says she wants to decide things for herself. Is there anything we can say to make her see she is losing something she can never gain back by not being alone when first married?"

(A) I do not feel that it is essential to have a place of their own for young people to be happy. If they are buying their own furniture, they can make the room or rooms they share a "place of their own" even if it is in the home of the young man's parents.

If I were in your place, I would be far more concerned about the fact that this man is contemplating marriage without a cent in reserve than I would be about their living with his parents.

ing with his parents. After working for eight years, and with no board to pay, it seems strange to me that he has nothing saved. It seems even stranger that he has the nerve to ask a girl to marry him under such conditions.

So long as your daughter will be living in the home of her in-laws, you can feel secure about her having a roof over her head and food to eat. But it is not a wise beginning for young people to start off their marriage with empty pockets. Your daughter may realize the seriousness of having no nest egg for emergencies and that may be why she has consented to live with her in-laws. If her attitude toward them is favorable and they are willing to accept her as a daughter, all should go well.

If, however, all does not go well, it will be a difficult situation for her. When a husband feels that a home of his own is "throwing money away" and when he has nothing saved, the wife is almost doomed to a life

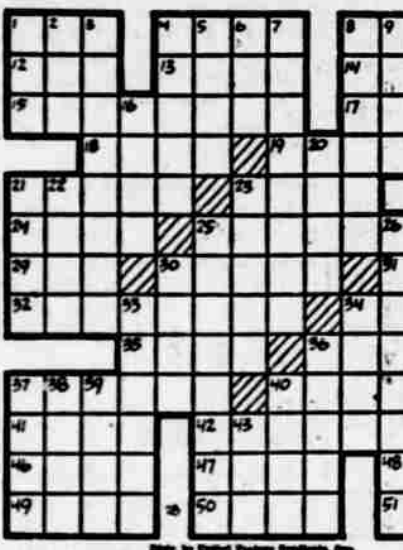
Mills' land, the farmer pumped pistol bullets into the truck's tires. A jury cleared him of charges of malicious mischief and disturbing the peace.

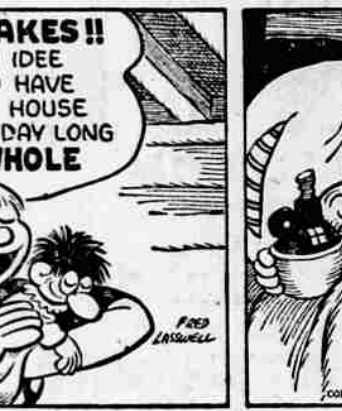

THE MANIFESTATIONS OF P. D.

The oracle who presides over this contumacious column must have been nodding when he pounded out the piece titled "Nutritional Deficiency and Pyorrhea (Feb. 18) or maybe overdue for a conference on the bowling green. In the first paragraph I said:

"The trouble known as pyorrhea, in my opinion, is not a specific disease but a manifestation of physical degeneration due to nutritional deficiency."

Incidentally, young ones there's a sentence to practice your diction, construction, etymology, punctuation and even your grammar (ouch) on.

Two or three games... paragraphs further along in the same piece I said:

"In my opinion" (anyway my construction was better, don't you think?) "chronic rheumatiz or arthritis" (if you prefer the more expensive term) "is a manifestation of physical degeneration due to nutritional deficiency."

If at first you infer that my needle stuck or the typographers gummed things up you had better do some thinking before you call attention to the obvious blunder. Before I turn up my toes you're going to learn, I hope, that pyorrhea and chronic rheumatiz (arthritis to you, Wiseacre) are not the half of it. I have some more bad news for you today, to-wit:

In my opinion hardening of the arteries (arteriosclerosis) and most cases of chronic heart disease are manifestations of physical degeneration due to nutritional deficiency. I keep repeating physical degeneration lest lunheads infer I am casting aspersions on the

morals of people with pyorrhea, rheumatiz or cardio-vascular degeneration. As one of my devalued assistants, N. Webster, describes it in the Unabridged, degeneration is:

4. Mod. Deterioration of a tissue or an organ in which its vitality is diminished, a substitution of a lower for a higher form of structure, either by chemical change of the tissue or the deposit of abnormal matter in the tissues.

That's pretty good, but Stedman's Medical Dictionary gives a better definition of degeneration:

A retrogressive pathological change in cells or tissues in consequence of which the functioning power is lost and the living substance becomes converted into an inert mass.

Even Stedman seems a shade too gloomy about it. He might have said "in consequence of which the functioning power is impaired or weakened and may be lost if the degeneration process is not retarded or reversed."

I'm not a therapeutic optimist but I believe it is possible to retard or arrest the degeneration in most instances—that is, to bring about regeneration and restoration of function.
