

Boston Braves Pilot Will Depend on Kids

Bradenton, Fla. — (U.P.) — Tommy Holmes, in his first full season as manager of the Boston Braves, has decided "to sweat it out with kids" this season, even if they cost him ball games.

"We are building for the future," he explained, "and while we aren't conceding anything to anyone, it may take our club a year to jell. We finished fourth with what we had last season and they don't pay off on anything but first place. So, it was imperative we get some new blood."

"That's why I'm going with the kids as far as I can, even though their mistakes may be costly ones. When you are looking to 1953 and 1954 you have to expect to take a few lickings in your rebuilding year and that's what 1952 is going to be for us."

Club Sized Up
From what he has seen of his prize rookies, he sizes up his club this way:

"We are 100 per cent improved in speed and bench strength and our infield will be 25 per cent stronger than last year. I'm satisfied with my outfield of Sid Gordon, Sam Jethroe and Willard Marshall, and pitching should be our best department, even with the loss of Chet Nichols to the armed services. Our catching is fair."

The veteran Walker Cooper and Ed St. Claire, who hit .282 as a rookie last season, will divide the catching, with Paul Burris, up from Milwaukee, the No. 3 man.

Only one infield position is set—Earl Torgeson at First Base—although if Bob Elliott comes to terms he may start the season at third. But Rookie Ed Matthews, a fine hitter but erratic fielder, and Bill Klaus, a good glove man but weak hitter, are battling for the job right now.

Cusick Short
At short, it probably will be John Cusick, the light-hitting, but fine fielding shortstop, obtained from the Cubs. Another newcomer, Bill Reed, who hit .311 at Milwaukee last season, is competing against Roy Harris.

Only two pitching spots are set—the veteran lefty, Warren Spahn, one of the best in the game, and Vern Bickford, who won only 11 last season.

Behind them as starters Holmes has such holdovers as Jim Wilson, who has looked very good this spring, Max Surkont and Dave Cole; and Rookie Gene Conley, the six-foot, eight-inch fire-balling righthander who won 20 games at Hartford last year.

For relief, Holmes has four rookies, all up from Milwaukee, whom he believes "may fill the bill." They are Maynard Thiel, a 14-game winner; Virgil Jester, who won 13; Dick Hoover, with a 5-4 record; and Ernie Johnson, a 15-game winner.

Philadelphia — (U.P.) — Coach Ken Loeffler said Friday his La Salle college champions of the National Invitation basketball tournament will go into the U.S. Olympic trials against tough St. John's Saturday fully aware they are "only two games away from a trip to Europe."

The coach of the Cinderella team of the recent NIT championship pointed out that if his Explorers defeat St. John's in the opening round and then score a second round victory, they will be in the finals against the nation's top amateur five.

Hawaiian Natator Beats Marshall
Princeton, N. J. — (U.P.) — Ford Konno, the Ohio State freshman who already has shattered John Marshall's bid for a second triple sweep at the NCAA swimming championships, will try to hand the Australian star and his Yale teammates another defeat Friday in the 220-yard free-style event.

Konno cut the water like a hungry shark in the final two laps Thursday night to pass defending champion Marshall and went on to set a new meet record of 18 minutes, 15.5 seconds in winning the 1,500-meter event.

Jimmy McLane of Yale also passed the tiring Marshall in the final lap and trailed the 19-year-old Hawaiian by four yards at the finish.

Castellani, Bratton Mix
New York — (U.P.) — The guy who "gets the break" probably will lose Friday night when two somewhat brittle gladiators—Johnny Bratton and Rocky Castellani—meet in a television 10-rounder at Madison Square Garden.

Dusky Bratton of Chicago, former NBA welterweight champion, has suffered three broken jaws and several hand injuries during his eight-year career. In fact, he is fighting Friday night because a bruised left fist prevented a Garden appearance March 14.

Middleweight Castellani of Luzerne, Pa., has suffered three hand fractures and an arm injury in six years of leather tossing.

R. Graziano Wins Easily

Minneapolis — (U.P.) — Rocky Graziano was ready Friday to begin serious training for his April 16 shot at the middleweight title, that once was his, after an easy tune-up victory.

The rushing Rock barely worked up a sweat as he scored a technical kayo in 2:30 of the first round over awkward Roy Wouters of Vancouver, Canada, Thursday night.

Uppercut Drops
Graziano, at 164 pounds, blasted Wouters with a stiff right uppercut that dropped the Canadian like a sack of cement. Wouters rose at the count of nine with glazed eyes and wobbly legs. Referee John Deotis stepped between the two boxers and raised Graziano's hand in victory. Wouters weighed 167 pounds.

Graziano had originally scheduled Thursday night's match as a tune-up for his forthcoming middleweight championship battle with titleholder Ray Robinson at the Chicago Stadium on April 16.

President Revels in Walking Privilege

Washington — (U.P.) — President Truman revealed Friday in the privilege of walking to work—instead of "commuting" 200 yards by limousine from Blair House.

The walk to his executive office was only a few short feet from the freshly-painted and renovated White House where Mr. Truman spent his first night in more than three years.

Immediately upon his return from a three-week vacation in Key West, Fla., the sun-bronzed chief executive and Mrs. Truman moved back into the White House from the cramped quarters of Blair House, where they have lived while the presidential mansion underwent a \$5,700,000 overhaul.

Cash, Securities Await Investors

Seattle — (U.P.) — An estimated \$1,000,000 in cash and securities due Pacific Northwest investors in reorganized companies lies unclaimed, and a search has begun for persons entitled to the valuables.

The cash and securities are due persons holding old stocks or bonds which were supposed to be redeemed during reorganizations, James E. Newton, regional administrator of the SEC, said.

Copies of a list of stocks that have been redeemable and absolute by reorganizations are available at the SEC office here, he said.

Hanford Atomic Plant Work Resumed

Richland, Wash. — (U.P.) — Work resumed Friday on a \$180,000,000 expansion program at the Hanford atomic plant as disgruntled AFL teamsters went back to their jobs pending final negotiation of a jurisdictional dispute.

About 5,400 workers were left without transportation to their jobs when about 500 teamsters struck last Tuesday for the second time in two weeks. The strikers objected to a labor-management committee's decision which permitted members of the Plumbers' and Steamfitters' union AFL to perform certain loading and unloading assignments.

Disaster Relief Fund Granted East Montana

Washington — (U.P.) — President Truman Friday allocated an additional \$25,000 for disaster relief in eastern Montana. Press Secretary Joseph Short said the money will be used to open roads closed by recent snowstorms.
