Wednesday Study club will meet at the Girls Community club at 2 p.m. on Wednesday, April 2. This will be the annual guest day.

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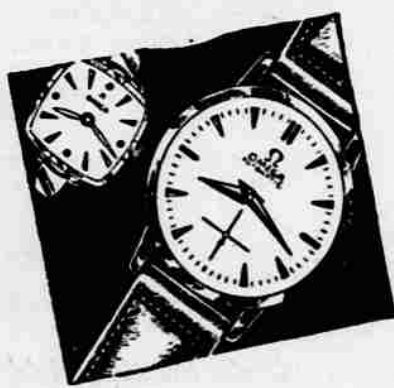
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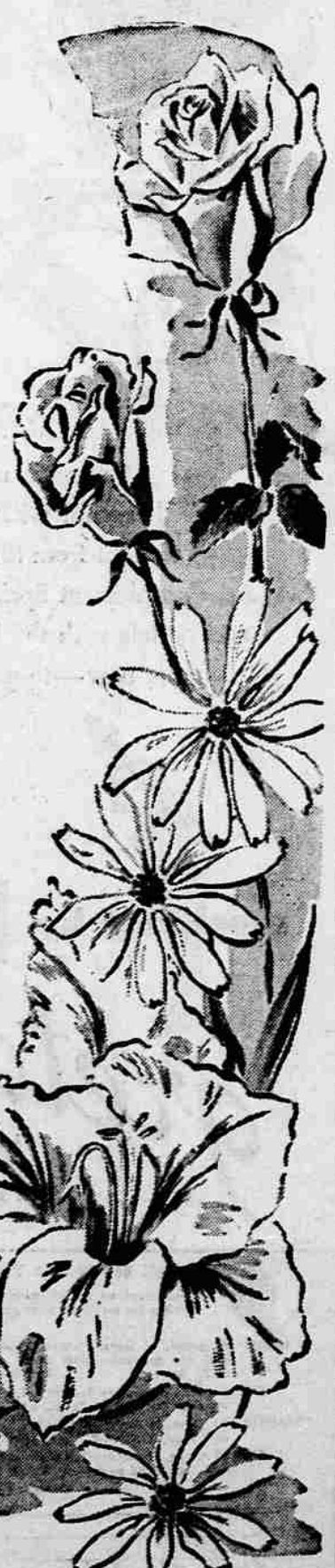
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
