Program for Oregon Farms Planned for Next 25 Years

Corvallis — (AP) — The 1952 Oregon state agricultural conference ended Saturday with preliminary programming of the state's farming development for the next 25 years.

Some 800 farmers, Oregon State college faculty members and extension service personnel, during a three-day session on the college campus, formed 12 conference committees which set the pattern for Oregon's agricultural future. It was the second such conference ever held in the state.

The committees called for more research, additional extension service specialists and programs aimed at bringing about more economical agricultural production.

sions suggested a state-wide poll of farm commodity organizations to determine advisability of setting up an agricultural forum composed of officers of these groups to study future dairying needs and problems and advise the industry of planning procedures.

Beef Cattle Needs Stressed

More productive pastures and more efficient beef cattle were needs stressed by the beef cattle committee. The group also urged experimental work to determine proper handling and usage for livestock of by-products from non-livestock crops and cannery wastes.

Oregon's turkey industry representatives said the market outlook for surplus turkeys will improve as the population and per capita consumption increase.

The farmers also were told that the fields of horticulture and specialty crops had showed a growth in the state that could not have been predicted when the first state agricultural conference was held here 25 years ago.

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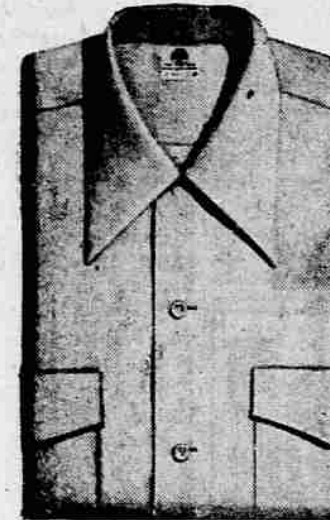
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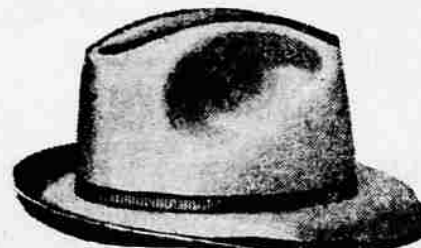
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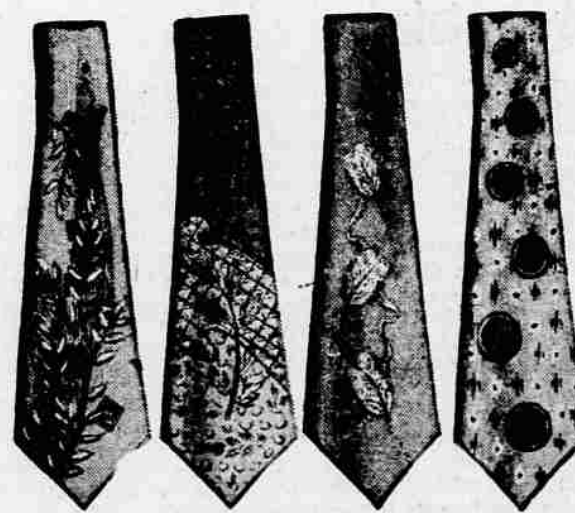


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
