Foreign Student Speaks for Group In Eagle Point

Eagle Point—Miss Ivy Coffey, of Delhi, India, spoke at the March meeting of Eagle Point Parent-Teacher association. Miss Coffey, a student at Southern Oregon college, spoke on education in her country. Indian schools, she said, are patterned after the English school system but efforts are being made to make education more typically Indian.

Language, in India, is a serious barrier to mass education of the people, the speaker said. To teach in India, a teacher must be able to teach in the language of the province. There are 12 separate provincial languages and 250 dialects. Miss Coffey stated that an adult education program is attempting to reduce the illiteracy of the population, requiring one to be able to read and write a post card to be considered literate.

Miss Coffey favors coeducation but said it has not been possible, generally, because of the limited school facilities and the necessity of a family to choose which child may attend, the boys having preference. A number of the mission schools are boarding schools, she said.

AAUW Conference Held in Ashland Attended by Many

Seventy-nine Jackson county girls, their mothers and other adult leaders, attended the Ashland Conference for Young Women held Saturday on the Southern Oregon college campus under the sponsorship of American Association of University Women.

The meeting was planned to give high school girls of 25 Southern Oregon and Northern California communities an opportunity to exchange ideas on common problems. Branches of the AAUW at Medford, Ashland, Grants Pass, Coos Bay, Klamath Falls and Lakeview cooperated in sponsoring the program which had as its theme "Mirror for the Future."

More than 400 young women, adult leaders and Southern Oregon college students participated in the all-day session which was directed by Mrs. C. D. Winston, Ashland, Northwest regional vice-president of AAUW. Miss Charleen Kring of the Ashland AAUW branch served as administrative coordinator of the program.

Among the 60 AAUW consultants who assisted were Mrs. Lawrence E. Butler, dean of girls at Medford high school; Miss Florence L. Aasen, dean of girls at Crater high; Miss Pauline Schapowsky, girls' adviser at Phoenix high; Mrs. Katherine Hallyburton, girls' adviser at Prospect high; Mrs. N. W. Christeson, Mrs. Harry Dawson, Mrs. Jerry Tobin, Mrs. Fletcher Fish, Miss Eula Wintemote and Miss Alice M. Grace, Medford.

In the opening session Saturday morning, Mrs. Winston said in welcoming the invited guests that the conference could be compared with the old fashioned quilting parties in which women young and old compared their problems. Dr. Elmo N. Stevenson, president of SOC,

extended greetings of the college and said the importance of the conference is "woman's place behind the scenes" in directing affairs of the nation today.

Miss Martha Shull, Portland AAUW member and consultant, stressed the importance of the individual and said there should be renewed concern about modern spiritual values. Mrs. Justin Smith, Medford, summed up the objectives of the conference and urged girls to look clearly at the life ahead of them.

Leaders of the six participating AAUW branches introduced included Mrs. C. B. Collins, Medford; Mrs. Elmo N. Stevenson, Ashland; Mrs. Merle F. Stockman, Grants Pass; Mrs. Frank Whitlock, Coos Bay; Mrs. Charles Larkin, Klamath Falls, and Mrs. Forrest E. Cooper, Lakeview.

Following the opening assembly, girls and their mothers met in small discussion groups to consider personal habits, family relationships, employment opportunities and spiritual values. The high school delegates were entertained at a noon luncheon at Susanne Homes hall and a style show was presented for their enjoyment. Adult conferees met at the same time at the Ashland Elks club for lunch.

Tours of the campus were conducted in the early afternoon under the direction of the Future Teachers of America club. The conference was reconvened at Churchill hall where summaries of the 11 panel discussions were presented and the concluding summations offered by Miss Shull and Mrs. Smith. Refreshments were served in Memorial Court by the Ashland AAUW branch to end the all-day session.

Professor Bjorlie said the male quartet also appeared Friday evening at the Talent high school basketball team banquet.

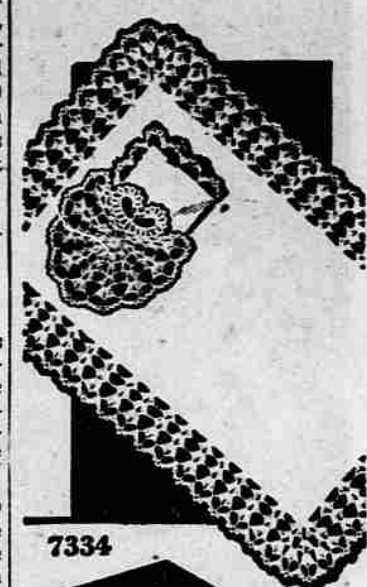

American Artists To Participate in Exposition of Arts

New York, Feb. 16—(U.P.)—The United States will be well-represented at the forthcoming Exposition of the Arts sponsored by the Congress for Cultural Freedom and scheduled for Paris in May.

The theme of the congress is the intellectual and artistic achievements by men of the free world in the past 50 years in the fields of music, ballet, painting and other art forms.

The Boston Symphony Orchestra will make its European debut at the Paris opera on May 6. The entire orchestra will be transported abroad and in addition to its engagements during the Paris festival, will be heard in The Hague, Amsterdam, various cities in western Germany and possibly in Belgium and Italy. The orchestra is headed by Charles Munch, musical director, and Pierre Monteux, associate conductor.

The New York City Ballet Company also will attend the exposition, which is called "Masterpieces of the 20th Century." Igor Stravinsky will conduct
