Medford, Sublimity Teams Knot in Shoot

Medford team No. 1 and Sublimity tied in the team competition which was the main event of the indoor smallbore sectional rifle tournament staged here Saturday and Sunday by the Medford Rifle and Pistol club.

Each tabulated a 1,541. The scores were air mailed to National Rifle association headquarters at Washington, D. C., where they will be placed in competition for the national championship. About 30 other sectional meets are being held.

On the Medford quartet were D. J. Bolton, Frank Rush, Harry Haidenreich and Lew Conger. Firing for Sublimity were Norman Whitehead, Herman Breitenstein, Eugene Laux and Carl Browning.

Whitehead, a Turner resident, was individual titlist of the two-day sectional with an aggregate of 779.

Breitenstein, a Staytonite, was second with 773—54x, and Robert Victorin, Malin, was close behind with 773—42x. Laux, Stayton, with 770, and Heidenreich, Medford, with 768, rounded out the high five.

In international aggregate Whitehead had 582, Breitenstein 576 and Victorin 573.

Medford entered three quartets in the team part of the shoot, Ashland three and Klamath Falls one.

Corvallis — (U.P.) — Oregon State's 1932 football prospects took a nose-dive Monday with announcement that star sophomore tailback Dave Mann has been suspended from school because of low grades.

Mann, one of the top sophomores on the coast last season, was a triple threat man. He was second in coast punting averages. He wound up seventh in rushing with 483 yards for an average of 4.1 per carry.

Mann was suspended by the academic deficiencies committee. There was hope on the OSC campus that Mann might enroll in a junior college to raise his grade average and petition for re-entry into Oregon State.

Death Takes Bo McMillin
Bloomington, Ind. — (U.P.) — Alvin Nugent (Bo) McMillin, beloved former coach of Indiana University and one of the most respected men in American sport, died quietly early Monday of heart attack.

He was 57 years old.

McMillin was football coach at Indiana from 1934 until 1947 and athletic director in 1946 and 1947.

The white-haired coach's family was at his bedside at the time of his death.

Took Leave
Doctors said recently that he seemed to be improving from a siege of ill health that caused him to take a leave of absence from his job as coach of the Philadelphia Eagles. He came to the Eagles after three seasons with the Detroit Lions.

McMillin, one of the most colorful figures in collegiate football history, was picked on Walter Camp's All-American team of 1919 and was a legend at Indiana where he was head coach for 14 years.

Silver thatched "Bo" first gained fame as a diminutive quarterback on the storied Centre college team that humbled mighty Harvard and other "big" teams of the early 1920's.

WSC Ski Team Captures Toga

Prognosticator Sees Little Hope for Cubs

Mesa, Ariz. — (U.P.) — One look at the Chicago Cubs is enough to produce that sinking feeling although Manager Phil Cavarretta staunchly insists he hasn't abandoned hope.

"I know we're not a bunch of world beaters," concedes Cavarretta, "but I don't think the picture actually is as black as some people paint it."

"Our catching is improved, we have a sound infield and if our pitchers come through, there's no telling how high we might go. If our regular pitchers like Bob Rush, Bob Kelly, Turk Lown, Johnny Klippstein and Paul Minner can win regularly, we'll have a much stronger team than most people expect."

Off their spring showing, however, the Cubs appear destined to wind up in the National league cellar again, or at best, not far from it.

The outfield is pathetically weak and even Cavarretta admits it is exceptionally thin on talent.

Left-handed hitting Frank Baumholtz, who batted .284 last season, and long-ball belting Hank Sauer are the only outfielders assured of regular spots. Sauer, who smacked 30 homers and drove in 89 runs last year, gives Chicago most of its long distance punch.

Castoffs Battle
Battling for the third spot are such castoffs as Gene Hermanski, Bob Usher, Jack Wallaesa and Ron Northey, who has come out of retirement. Hal Jeffcoat, a holdover who hit .273 but batted in only 27 runs, may take the position away from all of them again.

Behind the plate, Bruce Edwards' chronically sore arm makes him a distinct question mark but Cavarretta is depending upon husky Johnny Pramesa, acquired from Cincinnati.

Harry Chitt, a promising 19-year-old receiver up from Des Moines, might have inherited the first string receiving job but he is Army-bound.

Third baseman Ransom Jackson is the best man in the infield although rookie Leon Brinkopf, who hit 25 homers and drove in 93 runs for Los Angeles of the Pacific Coast league, may develop into a future star.

Smalley Back
Towering Roy Smalley, who has shown little improvement the past two years, will be back at shortstop, teamed up alongside Eddie Miksis, who has improved steadily since leaving Brooklyn last June.

Lanky Dee Fondy is receiving a thorough trial at first base but is still badly fouled by sweeping curve ball pitching.

After his front-line pitchers, Cavarretta intends to use Willard the Knuck Ramsdell, Joe Hatten, Cal McLish and perhaps Warren Hacker. Dutch Leonard, reliable 42-year-old knuckleball artist, again will head the relief corps.

Wid Matthews, the Cubs' shrewd director of player personnel, says he hopes the team can get by this year and then it should be ready to move up.

Chicago's future is bleak, to say the least, and its present isn't even as good as that.

Matthews Bills Portland Bouts
Seattle — (U.P.) — Seattle's Harry (Kid) Matthews will fight in Portland and San Francisco this month, his manager, Jack Hurley, said Monday.

The leading light-heavyweight contender will fight in Portland April 14 against an unnamed opponent, possibly Dick Wagner, and on April 28 he will meet Brooklyn heavyweight George Kaplin.

Oakland Acorns Seen as Likely Winner in Coast League Chase

San Francisco — (U.P.) — In the usual blaze of opening-day ceremonies, the Pacific Coast league starts its 1932 campaign Tuesday with about 40,000 fans expected to witness the first games in San Diego, San Francisco, Hollywood and Sacramento.

Remembering that your reporter failed to pick the winner last year, Seattle, but did go on

record as being the only baseball prognosticator in captivity who picked the last place club, San Francisco, we'll go out on the limb again this season with this fearless forecast:

1. Oakland Acorns.
2. Seattle Rainiers.
3. Los Angeles Angels.
4. Hollywood Stars.
5. Portland Beavers.
6. San Francisco Seals.
7. San Diego Padres.
8. Sacramento Solons.

May Be Easier
Picking winners in the Pacific Coast league may be easier after the 1932 season, because from now on the club owners won't have to sell off their stars to avoid losing them in the draft.

As of right now, not a single team in the circuit is "set" for the pennant chase. All managers are hoping fervently for additional help and every club, with the possible exception of San Francisco, is crying for pitching aid.

The selection of the Oakland Acorns for the top spot is based upon the remarkable ability of Owner Brick Laws to get what he goes after. He has two of the most sought-after outfielders down from the big leagues in Sam Chapman and Danny Littwhiler; he got a great young first baseman in Tookie Gilbert, and he has a fine all-round infield. The club still needs some pitching and catching strength—but count on Laws to get these.

Pitchers Needed
Seattle, Los Angeles and Hollywood are pretty well set with the exception of the pitching departments. Manager Stan Hack at Los Angeles still wants an experienced third baseman, and the Stars still are unsettled in the outfield, too.

On paper Portland doesn't appear to be very strong, but the Beavers have been very good in spring exhibitions and they have a great minor league manager in Clay Hopper—who has finished in the first division 18 out of 20 years.

San Francisco, with a complete new roster, looks very weak on paper with the exception of the

mound stuff. The infield isn't settled and there are some doubts about the hitting ability of the outfield.

San Diego, beaten consistently in spring exhibitions, doesn't appear to have a first division combination unless a lot of additional help is obtained for both the infield and outfield.

Sacramento has a flock of ex-big leaguers on its roster who should do well during the first half of the campaign. But the bench is slim and unless Manager Joe Gordon does a rejuvenation job, he is going to have trouble holding the gang together when the hot weather hits.
