Lieutenant Coverstone now is serving in Japan as an information and education officer for a squadron of the 315th airborne division which operates in Korea. They expect to sail soon for Japan to join Lieutenant Coverstone, Mrs. Tucker said today. Both the children were born in Grants Pass. Women Given Rules To Get Into Girdle

Chicago—(U.P.)—A manufacturer of women's undergarments has come forth with a set of rules for putting on a girdle.

The Formfit Co. says many women don't know how.

For the full step-in or pull-on type, the company set forth this procedure:

1. Remove Slippers.
 2. Turn the garment inside out.
 3. Pull it up over the knees, as high as it will go, still inside-out.
 4. Now pull the upper part up into position, turning the girdle right side out.
 5. Straighten it by pulling it higher at the waist.
- For the semi step-in type, the company recommended:
1. Remove slippers.
 2. Open the fasteners.
 3. Step into it, raise it well past the waist and close the fasteners.
 4. Straighten it by pulling down on the sides and back, not the front.
- On the hook-and-eye type, the company said the bottom hook should not be unfastened when the girdle is donned.

Bathrooms Fairly Safe, Plumbers Say

Milwaukee—(U.P.)—There's been much talk about the bathroom being the most dangerous room in the home but the plumbers say it isn't so.

Ed J. Massino, president of the Wisconsin Master Plumbers Association, says insurance company statistics show only 3.5 per cent of all home accidents occur in the bathroom, compared with 30 per cent in the kitchen-dining area, 18 per cent in living-sleeping quarters and 12 per cent on steps and stairs.

The other household accidents happen in the yard, basement, utility room, attic or garage, he said.

Sound Wave Use in Brain Surgery Studied

Chicago—(U.P.)—Sound waves far beyond the range of human hearing some day may be used in brain surgery, according to a University of Chicago scientist.

Dr. Patrick D. Wall, assistant professor of anatomy, made the prediction in the magazine Science.

He described experiments in which sound waves of a million cycles per second have been used to destroy selected areas in the brains of experimental animals.

Wall said the sound waves, which can be focused like light, destroyed desired areas without seeming to affect the surrounding brain tissue.
