There's Gold In Your Farm Woodlot

(Third of a series of six articles on second-growth forests as a cash crop, prepared by private, state and federal agencies)

How can I harvest my farm woodlot timber and make the most money? That's the most important consideration. The answer rests in proper management of your woodlot.

You have seen that more than one product can be taken from your woodlot. The products you get depend on 1) type of timber you have, 2) local markets, 3) selling prices, and 4) logging costs. Always cut the products that bring the most net return to you. Keep in touch with markets and buyers. To manage your trees you work with nature. Each young forest starts with thousands of trees to an acre. As the trees grow the weaker ones die for lack of sun, food, water and air. This natural thinning process is called mortality and the loss in unmanaged woodlots will run to a cord per acre each year.

You can harvest those trees and improve on nature. By cutting the right trees you will release growing space for the smaller, better quality trees in your woodlot. You change loss to income and at the same time improve your forest.

Removing the right number of trees each year is important. In Douglas fir forests you should go over every acre at 5 to 10 year intervals and take out from 15 to 20 per cent of the stand of mer-

Problems of Foreigners Puzzle Naturalization Man

New York—(U.P.)—Problems brought to Martin M. Gleisner's office are puzzling.

There may be a 57-year-old woman who has to find out the name of the ship she took to this country in 1910, or a 24-year-old Russian-born sailor who is a modern man without a country.

Gleisner, expert on immigration and naturalization for the Common Council for American Unity, crowds the case histories into files already filled with problems of people who dream of becoming American citizens. "About 100 people every month come to the office in person and nearly that many write each month," said the immigration authority. He himself was born in Germany, fled to France when Hitler came into power, and escaped to America when Germany defeated France in 1940.

Old Record Helps
On his desk was a volume entitled "European Passenger Arrivals, 1890-1930." "This is extremely valuable, and very hard to get," he said picking up the book. "Before 1924 people came to this country without a formal visa. Now, to become citizens, they must have their entry verified by showing their names on the ship's passenger list. If they can tell me the date of their sailing and the port, I can help them with this book."

Many of the explaining letters give extremely vague clues, such as: "I came on a German boat and arrived two days before All Saints Day in 1910." Many more letters are from foreign-born residents of this country who want to bring relatives over. Under our present quota system, many of Gleisner's answers must be disappointing.

"The quotas in countries like Lithuania, for instance, have been subscribed up to the year 2087," he explained. This happened because displaced persons, most of whom were quota immigrants, were charged to their countries' quotas for future years.

Underwater Explosion Tests Planned at Sea

Washington—(U.P.)—A series of underwater explosion tests will be conducted at sea instead of in Idaho's Lake Pend Oreille as originally was scheduled, Rep. Walt Horan said Tuesday.
Navy Undersecretary Francis Whitehair informed the Washington Republican that the Navy "at present is making plans to conduct the tests at sea and accepts the additional expense and loss of accuracy which an open test entails."

The Navy's plans for conducting the explosions in Lake Pend Oreille this spring met with strong opposition from sportsmen and the Spokane city commission.

Junior High Musicians Present Recital Here

In preparation for the district instrumental music contest of schools April 11 in Klamath Falls, junior high school students last night presented a recital of instrumental solos and ensemble numbers, according to I. A. Mirick, Medford schools instrumental music instructor.

About 30 entries will participate in the contest from the Medford senior high school and about 28 from the junior high, according to Mirick.

Recommendations in Transit Tiff Waited

Portland—(U.P.)—Portland's advisory transportation committee was expected to make its recommendations Wednesday on a settlement of a contract dispute between the AFL streetcarmen's union and the Portland Traction company.

The committee met Tuesday with Fulton Y. Magill, Tacoma transit expert, in an effort to make an interim recommendation.

Among questions which Magill was asked to answer concern the effect on the company's net revenue of a 15-cent cash fare, a \$2.40 pass and an 8-cent student fare, validity of the company's depreciation practices, what fringe benefits, such as relief from street maintenance, are practicable and whether allocation of expenses between city and interurban lines is proper. The traction strike, postponed once by the union, is now set for April 7.
