1st Farm, Home Loan To Vet Paid in Full

Salem — (U.P.) — The State Department of Veterans Affairs said Wednesday that the first loan made to an ex-serviceman under the Oregon World War II veterans' home and farm loan program more than six years ago has been paid off in full.

The department made its first loan in October, 1945, under the act approved by Oregon voters and the Legislature to provide four per cent loans to returning servicemen for the purchase of homes and farms. The first borrower was Earl A. Taw of Portland, an Army veteran.

A total of 8,025 veterans have borrowed \$33,534,890 to acquire homes under the act.
