Mr. Gustin gave the workers an opportunity to view the stage setting for the operetta, "The Tale of Peter Rabbit," to be presented by the school the same evening.

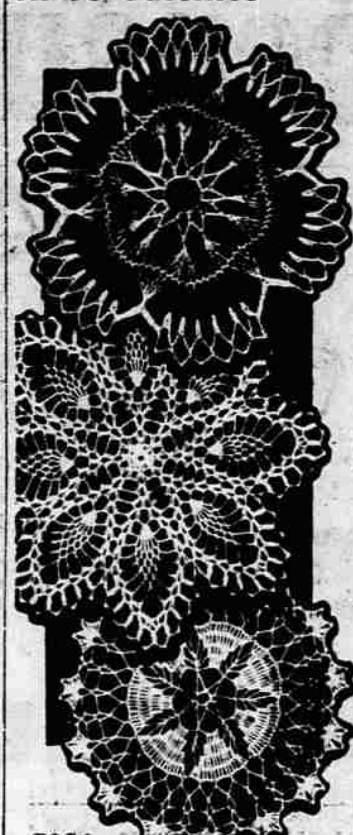
The chicken and noodle dinner will be served by the PTA from 5:30 until 7:00 and will be followed by the staging of the operetta at 7:30 p.m.

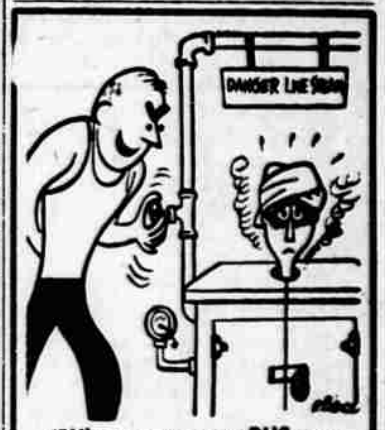
