Washington—(AP)—The Senate has passed a bill to give the states control of submerged lands for three miles off-shore with the federal government to have control of the rest of the offshore continental shelf.

Warm Welcome
Bobo was greeted by just about everybody in town as he was unloaded from the Alaska Steamship Co. freighter Flemish Knot Wednesday. The wayward pooch had been sent by Doug Boaz, who is in charge of the Seattle Humane Society kennels. Boaz had just about given up trying to find a home which the dog would prefer to the mass quarters of the humane society. Every time a new owner took the dog home, the animal would run off at the first opportunity.

Saw Dog's Picture
Cornelius read about the situation and saw a picture of Bobo in a Seattle newspaper, so he decided to ask for him.

Fan mail has poured in on Cornelius since the dog was shipped March 28. Most of it commended him for giving the dog a good home, but one Tacoma, Wash., lady was incensed to think he would take the animal away from the Humane Society where he apparently preferred to live.

University of Heidelberg Center of Romantic Legends

Heidelberg, Germany—(AP)—In the 566 years since its founding in 1386, the University of Heidelberg has become the center of more romantic legends than almost any other spot in the world.

It is the goal of every tourist in Europe who hopes to find an old and legendary spot where the Student Prince still sings to the pretty barmaids, where dim hallways are stained with blood from some forgotten duel and where students still gather in smoky inns to sing the old songs and down enormous quantities of Muenchener beer from quaintly-decorated mugs.

Strangely enough, the tourist will find all that and more, with patience.

The war left Heidelberg undamaged, although streams of refugees from less fortunate cities have filled the little town nestling on the banks of the Neckar river to the bursting point. Location of the army of occupation headquarters just outside Heidelberg swelled the population even more, and the main part of town has taken on the appearance of any overcrowded American street.

Time Rolled Back
Once off the main thoroughfare the tourist finds himself in the 18th century. In the "Old Town" nothing has changed since French troops burned the city in the 30-Years war.

The red sandstone castle whose foundations date back to medieval times still broods silently above the "Old Town."

Back in the endless maze of narrow alleys surrounding the square are the student inns for which the city is famous. The tourist will have to look closely to find them unless he should chance to pass at midnight when he will hear a hundred voices harmonizing to the strains of "Ich hab mein Herz in Heidelberg verloren."

The "Inn of the Red Ox," celebrated by Mark Twain, is possibly the best known. Its walls

are covered with names of the class of 1681 and later.

Tiny and Ancient

Not so well known to the tourist is the "Schnitzelbank," a diminutive little inn which can accommodate no more than 20 persons at one time. So many initials have been carved into its walls that there seems to have been room for no more in the last hundred years.

There are countless others.

At night, Heidelberg is a student's town as it has always been throughout 500 years of war, famine and dictatorship.

When the sun goes down, Heidelberg seems suddenly to shed the centuries and become medieval. Its venerable old University still echoes to the footsteps of the romanticists of 1800. The beer and songs will never change.

County Dairymen Get Milk 'Bonus'

Members of the Jackson County Dairy Herd Improvement association get a "bonus" of 100 pounds of butterfat from their herds, over and above the average for dairymen throughout the state, it was announced today by County Agent Earle Jossy.

Jossy said the information is contained in the 1951 report of the State Dairy Herd Improvement association.

Average production for the 1,029 cows tested in 44 herds was 377.6 pounds of butterfat annually, Jossy said, and 8,810 pounds of milk.

Highest-producing herd in the association was owned by W. D. Mongold and Son, Eagle Point, with an average production of 10,002 pounds of milk and 542.6 pounds of butterfat. The herd is all purebred Jerseys.

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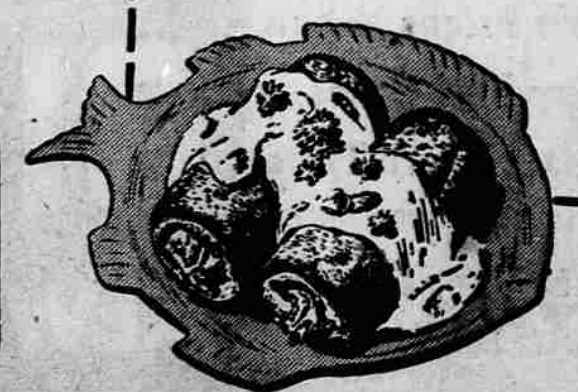
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Enjoy TUNA ROLL-UPS

This delicious Lenten Dish was developed by Betty Crocker's Staff at General Mills

Preheat oven to 450°. Sift together 3 cups sifted GOLD MEDAL Flour, 3 tsp. double-action baking powder, 1 tsp. salt. Pour into a measuring cup (but don't stir together) 1/2 cup WESSON Oil, 1/2 cup milk. Then pour all at once into the flour. Stir with fork until mixture cleans side of bowl and rounds up into a ball. Smooth by kneading dough about 10 times without additional flour. Place the dough between 2 sheets waxed paper (12 in. square).

Roll out until dough reaches edges of paper. Peel off top paper. Cut dough into 9 squares. Make tuna filling: flake 1 can (1 cup) WHITE STAR Brand TUNA; mix together with 1/2 cup minced celery, 1 egg, unbeaten. Spread 2 tsp. tuna filling over each square. Roll up each square as for jelly roll.

Place roll-ups, sealed side down, on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 10 to 15 minutes in hot oven (450°). Serve with hot sauce made by bringing to a boil (lower heat, stirring constantly) one 10 1/2-oz. can condensed cream of mushroom, celery or chicken soup and 2 tbsp. chopped parsley. Garnish with parsley or paprika. Serves 6 to 9.
