Crescent City, Calif. (U.P.)—A jury of six men and six women found Richard L. Jones, of McMinnville, Ore., guilty of murder Wednesday night in the January 26 hold-up slaying of a Crescent City grocer.

Robert W. Jones, a brother of Richard, was found innocent. The two men took part in the robbery in which Felix Molini, 58, was fatally shot. Richard fired the shot which killed Molini, testimony in the trial indicated.

There's Gold In Your Farm Woodlot

No. 5 (Fifth of a series of six articles on second-growth forests as a cash crop, prepared by private, state and federal forest agencies)

When your trees have passed their period of most rapid growth (about 30 years), the best policy is to clearcut and start a new crop either by natural seeding from close by mature trees or by hand planting. You should also clearcut woodlots where repeated thinnings have finally left too few trees.

Ordinarily the species growing on your land, generally Douglas fir, is the one best suited. Douglas fir reproduces best on clearcut areas. Seedlings like the shade of weeds and light brush to start, but when once established need plenty of sunlight. If the clearcut area is small, from 2 to 20 acres, and it adjoins or is surrounded by seed-bearing trees, it will reforest promptly by natural seeding. Fire must be kept out and stock fenced out. If there is a good seed crop right after logging the area will come back fast.

If you have had a good seed year you may want to leave your slash and provide better fire protection. Otherwise you will want to burn your slash the first time it's safe to do it and put your land in shape for the next tree crop.

If your land tends to grow brush, you will want to hand plant immediately to give your valuable timber crop a chance to get started before the brush slows it down. Even without brush, natural reforestation takes from 2 to 10 years, so you may want to get your crop of trees in quickly with nursery stock. Trees can be obtained from the State Forestry Departments of Oregon and Washington and some companies will supply nursery-raised seedlings to farmers. Winter planting is best and it comes when the farmer has the most free time.

Hand planting of seedlings requires some thought and care. A simple mattock, one of the hoe-type of tools, is all a tree planter needs. With one stroke of the mattock a suitable hole is opened to admit the roots of the seedling. Care should be taken to avoid leaving air space around the roots, to see that roots are straight and not turned up, that the tree is not too deep and that ground cover won't choke it out. Plant seedlings to get advantage of natural shade of stumps, down logs.

If you plant 4 by 4 feet spacing you will need 2720 trees per acre. Ideal is 6 by 8 foot spacing using 918 trees per acre, although some prefer 8 by 8 with 680 trees. Trees cost about \$5 per thousand. Next we will discuss logging, land clearing, interesting facts.

Resemblances Reported in Old Testament and Tablet

Paris (U.P.)—Surprising resemblances between the Old Testament story of the afflictions of Job and a Babylonian tablet about 1,000 years older than the biblical tale are reported by a French scholar.

Prof. Jean Nougayrol, a curator of the Louvre Museum, said there was a "strong similarity" with the Bible story in the fragmentary translation he recently completed on the clay brick imprinted with cuneiform letters.

He assigned a date of 1650 B.C. to the tablet because of its dedication to King Ammiditana, a Babylonian monarch reigning in the 17th century before Christ.

No exact date could be placed on the writing of the Book of Job, the professor said, although sections appear to have been transcribed from old folk tales about 600-700 B.C. That would indicate the Job tale existed for

Al Jones vanished from the vessel as it was docked at Ellis point on Vashon island, J. K. Woodruff, operating manager of the line, reported to the King county sheriff's office.

Woodruff said it was unknown whether Jones fell into the water or merely left the ship.

Newell Air Crash Fatal to Two Men

Newell, Calif. (U.P.)—Two men died Thursday when a light plane crashed and burned three-quarters of a mile south of the Newell airport.

The victims were identified as Glen Smith, head of the Growers association at Tule Lake, Calif., and Marvin Christy, 30, of Coppock Bay, a homestead area a few miles south of Newell.

Smith was killed instantly and Christy died about 10 a. m. in a Klamath Falls, Ore., hospital.

The Taylorcraft plane crashed about 7 a. m. in a sagebrush patch. Two residents of the area, Robert F. Hirschback and Everett Lynum pulled the victims from the plane, and put out the fire.

Newell is about 30 miles south of Klamath Falls.
