EVERYONE HAS THE RIGHT TO PRIVACY

The desire for privacy is a universal human desire. Even little children like to feel that they can have secrets and they resent having to tell things they don't want to tell. By the time the child has grown into a teenager, this desire for privacy makes a teenager boil with fury. If this were recognized more widely than it is, much of the friction in homes would be eliminated. The following letter expresses the point of view typical of boys and girls of the teens:

Q. "I am 15 years old and I have a room to myself. My two brothers, ages 5 and 13 years, are always coming into my room and bothering me or looking into my drawers. I tell my mother and she threatens them but it has not done much good. They forget and come in again. I like the privacy of my room like other teenage girls. What can I do about this?" T.N.

A. Of course you like privacy and you are entitled to have it. You brothers, I am sure, would be the first ones to become angry and go running to your mother if you went through their possessions.

Threatening them will not bring results. A threat is a case of meaningless words. After it has been used several times and ends there, with no carry-through of the threatened punishment, it soon falls on deaf ears.

Call family council. Why not call a family council and put the matter squarely before them? Explain your point of view and let the other members of the family do likewise. I believe they will all feel as you do.

Then, as a family unit, decide upon rules to regulate and enforce the privacy and property

rights of every member of the family. In addition, make rules regarding the punishments to be given if and when the rules are broken. Once the rules are made, see that they are enforced.

Only when people take a firm stand can they hope to make others see that they mean what they say. It is up to you to demand your rights and not permit your brothers or anyone else to violate them.

HOW TO WORRY THE NEIGHBORS

To the dismay of the neighbors and their teachers our four children go without hats, coats

or any other clothing they'd rather not wear, at any time of year and in any weather.

You see (the lucky youngsters' father writes), we feel they are not idiots, so they know whether they have enough on to keep comfortable.

The children have suffered no ill effects. They have had colds only rarely and always it has obviously been caught from some one who was careless about spreading infection. When our 11 year old daughter had sore throat the doctor called it tonsillitis and said her tonsils should be removed. She was well in a day or two and still has her tonsils. Other children in the neighborhood had sore throat at the same time, but they had already undergone tonsillectomy, so they had "glad trouble"—nothing to remove! (T. L.)

The dismay of the neighbors is the usual reaction of the unteachable but it is sad to find school teachers reacting like that. Perhaps that explains why the schoolroom is the most likely place to catch the cold (common respiratory infections—such as measles, diphtheria, scarlet fever, poliomyelitis, cerebrospinal meningitis, simple sore throat, tonsillitis whooping cough, influenza, coryza).

Doctors, school nurses, school teachers and parents who lay back their long ears and ascribe indispositions and illnesses they do not recognize to "cold," in spite of all modern scientific knowledge to the contrary—I hope the article I submitted for publication here Saturday, Jan. 12 was printed without too much

editing—it dealt with the conclusion reached by the British Medical Research Council after years of experimentation on volunteers—the long-eared ones must now take notice that as a nut I am in good company, for the British authorities conclude that wet feet, insufficient clothing, drafts, sudden changes and all that old hokum have nothing to do with the indispositions or illnesses which ignorant folk call "cold."

More power to T. L. and his happy children! And more dismay, annoyance, indignation and discomfort to the neighbors and teachers who have been dead from the neck up these past fifty years.

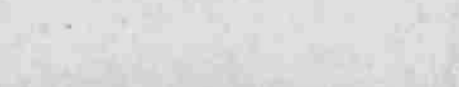
