

Senate Passes Bill Giving States Control Of Submerged Lands

Washington—(U.P.)—The Senate has refused to earmark revenues from submerged oil lands for aid to schools. By a 47 to 36 roll call vote the Senate tabled an "oil-for-education" amendment, sponsored by Sen. Lister Hill D-Ala., and 18 other Senators, to the so-called Tidelands bill.

Cleanup Planned For Rogue River April 13 to 20

Rogue River—A city-wide cleanup campaign was planned at the council meeting Tuesday evening at the suggestion of Ernie Lingren, one of the five visitors who attended. Lingren spoke on cooperation between the townspeople and merchants, and on a general cleanup program.

By action of the council, Mayor Fred Dengler proclaimed cleanup week from April 13 to 20. Residents are to sack or box all rubbish on their premises and place it in the most convenient spot for pickup by garbage trucks on Sunday, April 20. Pat Fahey of Pat's Sanitary service, who was present at the meeting, offered to haul the rubbish away free of charge, on the final day. Lingren stated he would furnish a pickup and truck with drivers on collection day.

The treasurer reported two water bonds were paid in March. The condition of Wards creek bridge, over which the logging trucks pass, was called to the council's attention, and it was voted to request the county to widen and strengthen the bridge.

An ordinance changing the street names to comply with the new city map was requested. The map is on display at the new office of the Times, on Depot street, and residents can purchase house numbers at the Meyers hardware store or the Rogue River Builders Supply.

Pat's Sanitary Service applied for permission to raise the garbage collection charges from \$1.25 to \$1.50 for residence pickup, starting May 1.

Notices for the sale of the old city hall are to be posted.

American Ponders What To Do With English Estate

Cuyahoga Falls, O.—(U.P.)—The question of what to do with an English legacy still bothers a valve salesman, James Gape, 46.

Gape was willed an estate estimated to be worth \$254,000. It includes two manor houses and 1,000 acres of land in England. It was bequeathed by his cousin, Sybil Gape, who died in December, 1950.

The catch in the will was a provision that Gape must take up permanent residence in England on the estate, within six months.

Decision Delayed At first, Gape thought the six months were up last summer and at the time he "half made up" his mind not to accept it. However, he said he has learned since that the six-month period will not start until the estate had been cleared of all debts, taxes and other encumbrances.

While those legal details are being worked out abroad, Gape is fretting over printed criticism from England. He lives here, not far from Akron, with his wife, Mary, 33, two sons, David seven, and Tommy, two months, and daughter Gracie, five, in a small but comfortable Cape Cod-style home while he ponders the provisions of the will.

The estate has been in the Gape family for 500 years and will go either to Gape, a brother in Detroit, or another cousin still in England. The American Gapes were born in Canada but came to the United States and are naturalized citizens.

"I've got my fingers crossed and I'm biting my nails over the whole affair," Gape said. He complained that he is perturbed over reports in English newspapers that were critical over his "doubts."

"It's not the simple choice the English papers make it out to be," he said. He cited a clipping from the London Daily Express which said the Gapes evidently are turning down "everything so many British couples are spending a lifetime working toward and dreaming about."

The story, written by an English newspaperwoman, also chided the Gapes for their hesitancy in not jumping on the fastest ship and getting to England.

Her remarks led Mrs. Gape to observe that "I have half a mind to take the next boat to England and tell that newspaperwoman what I think of her."

Defense Economy Depends on Autos

Chicago—(U.P.)—America's defense economy depends upon the number of automobiles available to workers, in the opinion of W. Rogers, executive vice president of the American Finance Conference.

Rogers, addressing the AFC's 18th annual convention here, said World War II proved that the defense program couldn't be carried on without automobiles to transport workers.

He said surveys showed that 13,000,000 people lived out of reach of public transit systems during World War II and that 75 per cent of the workers at 749 representative war plants depended on their cars to get to their jobs.

The situation is the same in the present defense buildup, Rogers said. As an example, he said that 98 per cent of the 1,500 employees of a Chicago area company come to work by automobile.

French Premier Scores Victory

Paris—(U.P.)—Premier Antoine Pinay, determined to ram his unpopular budget through Parliament or quit his job, won one victory in the National Assembly Thursday and promptly called for a vote of confidence on another big issue.

The assembly voted 351 to 212 to accept Pinay's call for a slash of \$314,235,000 in government spending.

Then, annoyed by delaying tactics, Pinay called for a vote of confidence on his proposal to block certain government credits as part of his budget-balancing program.

The vote will be taken Friday after the 24-hour interval prescribed by Parliament rules.

Pinay's victory on the spending slash vote followed three votes in his favor Wednesday night when he threatened to resign unless the assembly supported him.

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Box Canyon Dam Loan Gets Approval

Spokane—(U.P.)—The Reconstruction Finance Corporation has approved a loan of more than \$16,000,000 to the Pend Oreille county public utility district for the construction of Box Canyon dam, PUD Manager V. P. Campbell reported Thursday.

Campbell said he did not receive details of the RFC action, but understood the plan called for construction of the project on the Pend Oreille river near Lone to start as soon as possible.

Burrows Appointed Deputy CAP Director

Portland—(U.P.)—Brig. Gen. Paul E. Burrows, Vancouver, Wash., who recently retired after 34 years' active duty with the Air Force, Thursday was appointed regional director of the Civil Air Patrol.

Gen. Burrows will assist Harry K. Coffey, director of CAP region eight, which comprises Oregon, Washington, Alaska, Idaho, Nevada, California and Hawaii.

Recovery Sought in Non-Resident Fees

Juneau, Alaska—(U.P.)—Pacific American Fisheries has filed suit in U. S. District Court here to recover \$31,320 in non-resident fishing license fees from Taxation Commissioner M. P. Mullaney.

The action is expected to test whether non-residents who did not protest payment will get residents and \$50 for non-residents and \$50 for non-residents have been held illegal by the Supreme Court.

Attorney General J. Gerald Williams had said that territorial law provides for refunds only if payment was made under protest. The suit names 696 employees of the Pacific American firm, but makes no distinction among those who protested and those who did not.
