

Elizabethan Music Planned With Shakespeare Festival; Concert, Play Music Slated

Ashland — Activities of the Tudor guild and plans for a special concert of Elizabethan music during the 1952 Oregon Shakespearean festival were discussed at a meeting of the festival board held here Thursday night.

The Elizabethan concert will be given August 29 and will be free to holders of season's tickets. The concert will be planned by Hans Lampl, member of the music department of the University of Southern California, who has been added to the festival staff. Plans call for a full evening of Elizabethan music, with two choral groups and a small concert orchestra performing. The musical groups will be made up of valley singers and players.

In addition to the special concert, Lampl will plan a short musical program for each play and will take charge of the incidental music required for the plays.

Retired S. P. Man Visiting in City; Once Worked Here

Mr. and Mrs. Paul M. Krutzler, Eugene, are visiting relatives of Mrs. Krutzler near Central Point this week. Both are former valley residents. Krutzler was retired March 31 as a roadmaster from the Southern Pacific after 48 years of service with the company.

He began with the company in Medford in 1904 as a section laborer. Before that, as a very young boy, he served as water boy to help his father, Paul Krutzler, who also worked on the section. Krutzler said today, however, he was not on the Southern Pacific payroll while helping his father.

He left Medford as a foreman in 1908 for the Cow Creek canyon section; returned here in 1910 and left the same year to work on the Tolo line. From there he was transferred to the Tillamook branch and then to Eugene, later being promoted to roadmaster there and sent to Marshfield. He returned to Eugene in 1928 and has lived there since.

About 110 persons, including many Southern Pacific officials, attended a dinner in Eugene this week honoring Krutzler on his retirement.

His wife is the former Miss Mabel Webb, who has numerous relatives here. The Krutzlers have a daughter, Mrs. Bradford Muse, now living with her husband and daughter in Panama, C. Z., and a son, Gerald Krutzler, Eugene, who has been with Southern Pacific for 15 years and is in the stores department.

The retiring roadmaster said today that his years with the company had been pleasant ones and that he regretted he was forced by illness to retire so soon.

Materials Testing Reactor Operating At Idaho Plant

Idaho Falls—(U.P.)—The Atomic Energy commission revealed Friday that the second major unit of its multi-million dollar national reactor testing station near here—the materials testing reactor—has been placed in operation.

Idaho Operations Manager L. E. Johnston disclosed that the new reactor reached the "critical" stage five days ago and now is gradually being brought up to full power.

To Test Radiation

The \$18,000,000 nuclear "furnace" is designed to test the effect of intense radiation on materials being considered for use in the building of new reactors, many still on the drawing boards.

It is located only a few miles across the vast lava, sand and sagebrush covered AEC reservation between Blackfoot and Arco, from the experimental breeder reactor that went into operation in December.

The breeder reactor—ultimately intended to produce more fissionable material than it consumes—on Dec. 21 produced, for the first time, electrical power for motors and lights.

Other Projects

Still under construction, although progress is classified, at the reactor testing station are two other projects—a \$26,000,000 submarine thermal pile and a \$16,000,000 chemical processing plant.

The operating contractor in the materials testing reactor is the Phillips Petroleum Co., working under supervision of Johnston's Idaho operations office at Idaho Falls.

Effort Continued To Avert Machine Strike

Seattle—(U.P.)—Union representatives and meta-fabricating shop employers continued Friday to negotiate new work contracts as 500 Everett machinists, who have refused to work since Wednesday threatened to take official strike action.

Federal Conciliator Albin Peterson met with the two groups in a fruitless, day-long meeting Thursday.

Meanwhile, about 200 members of machinists local 79 set up picket lines around the Pacific Car and Foundry Co. plant at Renton. A union official said although the men left the job to protest the firing of an employee, they probably would stay out and support a general machinists strike, should one occur.

National Economy Can Absorb Slack

Seattle—(U.P.)—The American economy can absorb any slack resulting from curtailed defense production when the war in Korea ends, William J. Grede, president of the National Association of Manufacturers, said Friday.

Grede said current defense production is not taking the full 15 to 20 per cent of production which had been anticipated originally.

The NAM chief said national, state and local government takes 40 per cent of the national income. He attacked "waste and extravagance" and called for an end to all economic controls.

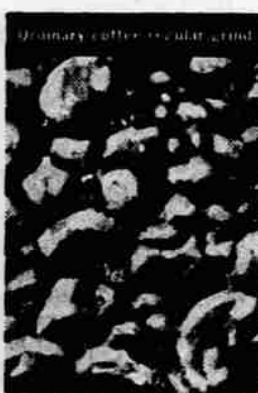


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
