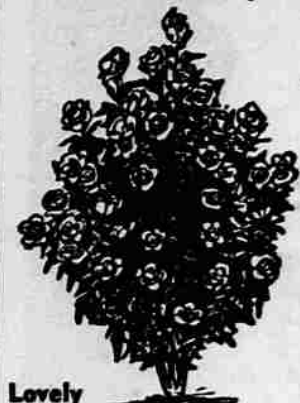

Portland—U.P.—The Wage Stabilization Board said Saturday it has approved a 10-cent an hour wage increase for an estimated 25,000 to 30,000 heavy construction and highway workers in Oregon and six southwestern Washington counties.

The pay boosts are for operating engineers, teamsters and laborers. The 10-cent gain includes five cents negotiated and five cents allowed to cover cost of living increases.

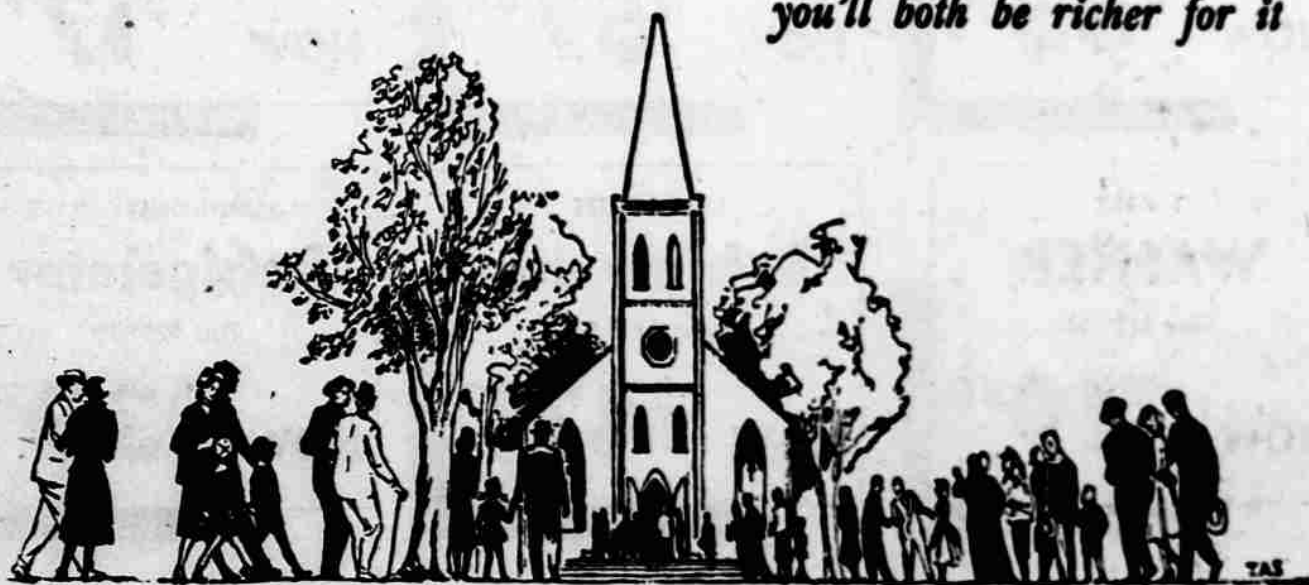
