Mrs. Calkins is said to be one of the west coast's finest harpists. She is a member of the University School of Music faculty.

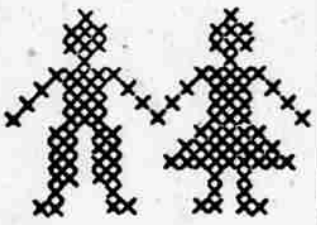
A string quartet, which has performed with success throughout the state, will appear with Mrs. Calkins.
