**Democracy Rules
In Unique School
Operated in East**

New York—(UPI)—A millionaire's son learns his ABC's alongside a servant's daughter in a New York school, one of the most unusual in the nation.

What's more, the millionaire foots the bill for the education of both children.

The institution is the Boardman school, a private one founded in 1939 and located in a small, three-story building in a smart residential section of Manhattan.

Its 70 children come from the penthouses of Park avenue, the slums of Harlem or the tenements of the lower East Side. They range in age from two and one-half to eight. They are admitted only because their mothers and fathers have passed an entrance examination of their own—a test of their attitudes toward all races, creeds and social groups.

It's Democratic
"We were founded on the democratic principle," explained Mrs. Diane Gray Johnson, the director. "The parents want their children growing up without prejudice. Otherwise, they have no business here."

The wealthy believe in equality to the extent of paying one of the highest tuitions ever charged by a nursery school—\$850 per term.

"Those who have pay for those who have not," said Mrs. Johnson, a vivacious brunette in her 30s.

Twenty per cent of the pupils are the "have nots," who attend on "scholarships," they're suggested to the school by the city's welfare department or other welfare groups.

Currently enrolled are the children of an architect, an actress, a union organizer, a carpenter, a maid, a Wall Street broker, and an artist, just to name a few of the groups represented.

Rockefellers There
Several of the Rockefeller children have attended. So did Gov. Thomas E. Dewey's son John. Benny Goodman, orchestra leader, sent his daughter Rachel to the school. So did the concert violinist Yehudi Menuhin. Two children of William Paley, chairman of the board of the Columbia Broadcasting System, were enrolled.

The blending of many social levels into one doesn't stop with the children. There's a parents' activities committee which meets at least once a week to discuss problems ranging from sex education to plans for a Father's Day party.

"I get a warm, rewarding feeling when I see all those different groups getting together on evenings," said Mrs. Johnson. "I've yet to see anybody pulling social rank on anybody else."

The subject will be "Making Belts and Buttons," and a potluck luncheon will be served. Child care may be arranged by calling phone 3-1310 by Monday evening.

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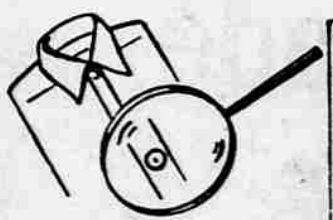
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
