United Nations Delegates Enjoy U.S. Food, Says Chef

New York — (U.P.) — The 60 countries in the United Nations often disagree with American politics but they like American food.

"Especially hamburger," said Jean Laparcerie, head chef for the newly opened kitchen and dining facilities in the UN's skyscraper secretariat.

"Just about everybody likes hamburger," said the French-born chef. "It's the item most often asked for in the cafeteria."

Even the delegates, who can dine in a separate, lounge-like room, if they like, order the American dishes on the menu.

"Mr. Gromyko... he's a lamb chop man," said Laparcerie of the Russian diplomat. "But, I've often served him a cold buffet and he didn't say so much as boo."

Like Curried Lamb
Americanized curry of lamb is the item most often ordered by delegates. It's served minus all the side dishes you'd get if it were served Indian fashion.

The UN agreement on food leads Chef Laparcerie to believe the harmony can be extended to the diplomatic level.

"If they don't fight over what they eat, maybe they can make peace elsewhere," the chef said with a grin.

The kitchen is geared to turn out delicacies such as quab under glass, if there's a request for such.

"We'll charge extra for that kind of service," said the practical Laparcerie.

Laparcerie has been cooking for UN diplomats and lesser ranking employees for five years, or ever since the meetings at Lake Success began.

Kitchen Is Vast
From his new headquarters he will direct the serving of 2,600 lunches per day, except when the Security Council is in session.

"Then it'll step up to about 3,900," he said.

A vast kitchen, covering almost 9,000 square feet, is the heart of the eating department. It's an outside version of what every woman dreams about for her own home.

Virtually every operation is done automatically. There are stainless steel cabinets and counter areas, mixing vats which can hold more than 100 gallons of cake or bread dough, and five cold-storage closets, each as

large as a small auto-trailer.

The UN administration officer said that annually it would take close to 5,000,000 cubic feet of natural gas to run the 15 gas ranges, broilers, roasting ovens, and numerous grills and toasters.

About 6,000,000 hour-pounds of steam will heat steam tables, operate steamers and run the dish-washing machines. More than 100,000 kilowatt hours will be ticked off in running the electrical equipment.

Average Income From Stage Work Proved Very Low

New York — (U.P.) — The drab picture of theater employment for actors has been painted again in the annual report compiled for Actors' Equity association by Alan Hewitt.

The average income of actors from work on the stage—the report doesn't cover outside work in radio, television, etc.—for the 12 months ended June 1, 1951 was \$790. That was \$50 less than in the 1949-50 season, \$30 more than in the 1948-49 season.

Oddly enough, the number of persons employed was greater—5,111 members of Equity as against 4,569 in 1949-50.

The average employment was slightly over 10 weeks during the 12 months. In the average week 82.3 per cent of the union's total membership were unemployed.

Fewer than one in eight members earned \$5,000 or more, although their number was slightly higher than in the two previous seasons. Less than one in 20 made at least \$10,000, 24 made more than \$50,000, six made more than \$100,000 and two topped the \$150,000 mark.

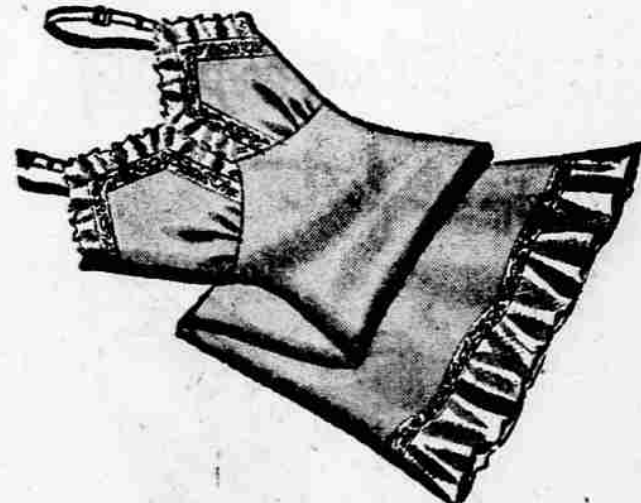

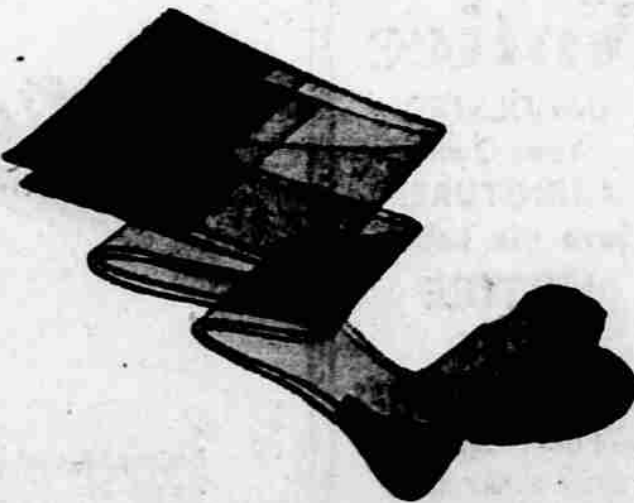
