## Weathermen Predict Cloudiness Will End Northwest Warm Spell

The Pacific Northwest basked in a summer sun Saturday but the weatherman sounded a pessimistic note when he predicted clouds and cooler temperatures for Sunday.  
Occasional rain also was expected along the coastal strip by Sunday.  
But Friday and Saturday the region soaked up the hottest weather in the last six months.  
80 at Medford  
The temperature rose to an almost uncomfortable 82 degrees at Roseburg Friday. Other highs in Oregon included Medford, 80; Pendleton, 77; Portland, 76; The Dalles, 74; Eugene and Salem, 73; and Klamath Falls, 72.  
The 76 at Portland was the

highest reading since October 9, 1951, when the mercury zoomed to 80 degrees.  
**Cooler on Coast**  
Along the coast it was 60 at Astoria and 54 at North Bend. The weather bureau forecast temperature drops up to 10 degrees throughout most of the Northwest Sunday.  
All mountain passes in Oregon and Washington were reported open to traffic.

## Around Hollywood

Hollywood — (U.P.) — The late Robert Walker's swan song, "My Son John," was unveiled Saturday, but a double and trick photography had to finish the movie for him.  
Walker had almost completed the brightest role of his brief career when he died tragically last August 28.  
But though he'd taken his last curtain call, the show went on without him.  
Director Leo McCarey found Actor Jon Keating, who could pass for Walker on a dark night. The movie-maker also pulled out his bag of movie tricks—and audiences will swear Walker was the star through the last foot of film.  
Sharp-eyed Hollywoodites, though, could spot the scenes shot after his death.  
**Story of Communist**  
The story tells about a government worker, Walker, who turns Communist, to the heartbreak of his mother, Helen Hayes, and father, Dean Jagger. The tale originally was to end with a reformed Walker delivering an anti-Communist speech at a college graduation. But he died before those final scenes were taken.  
So McCarey changed the story to have Walker dying before the graduation, and leaving his

speech on a wire recorder so it could be played at the school ceremonies.  
Double Keating was the star of the recording scene, but the room is dark and his back is turned to the camera. The close-ups of Walker apparently were snatched from earlier scenes.  
**Empty Phone Booth**  
Walker also is shown phoning from a public booth at an airport. But the scene was photographed with an empty phone booth after the actor died. Then a shot of Walker phoning in another scene in the picture was inserted into the empty window glass of the booth.  
Luckily, Walker had recorded the speech, as a sound test, the Saturday before he died. The rehearsal turned out to be his final performance.  
Hollywood already buzzes with talk that Walker may get a post-humous Oscar nomination for his fine performance. In his last interview, even he admitted that the role was "the first that gave me a chance to do some thinking."

## Wall Street

New York — (U.P.) — Prices declined slightly on the stock exchange in quiet dealings Saturday.  
Investors generally settled down to await the impact of the nation-wide steel strike which is called for Tuesday at midnight. As a result, dealings in the two-hour trading session were highly restricted with the reporting tickers standing idle for seconds at a time.  
Declines throughout the day were small with a number of pivots holding at their previous close. A number of issues failed to appear on the tape.  
Dow Jones closing stock averages: 30 Industrials 265.44, off 0.18; 20 Railroads 92.38, off 0.08; 15 Utilities 49.71, up 0.05; 65 Stocks 101.09, off 0.04.  
Sales Saturday totaled 430,000 shares, compared with 730,000 traded a week ago.  
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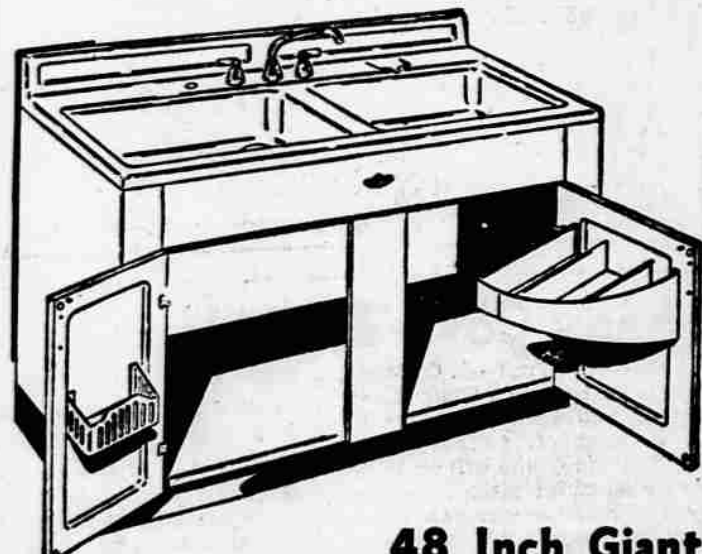


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
