Your Health and Its Care

WHO DOES UNDER STAND THE GOUT?

I suffer from more or less frequent attacks of gout, which I understand is one form of arthritis. (Signed.)

Then, sir, you should be telling me, not asking me, about gout, for I don't understand it any more than I do chronic arthritis, rabies or pyorrhea.

The entire concept of gout as a malady due to uric acid was based on circumstantial evidence—which was good enough for the doctors of the 19th century. The final and clinching proof that the trouble called gout was due to the deposit of uric acid in the affected tissues. In some instances such deposits formed actual lumps called "tophi" or "chalk-stones" under the skin about the joint or in the rim of the ear or elsewhere. But such evidence doesn't prove anything, after all, for many individuals who have such tophi (chalk-like masses of mono-sodium urate) haven't now and never have had anything answering the classical description of gout in old time medical textbooks.

There is a certain amount of uric acid present in the blood of a healthy person. In various circumstances the amount may be greater or less than normal, so it is hardly scientific to associate acid content of the blood with "gout."

Old timers chose to attribute "gout" to high living, too much "red meat," too much beer, wine or liquor, and (easy with this) laziness, sedentary habit, lack of daily exercise.

The plain truth is that such slight variations in the amount of uric acid present in various circumstances indicate only the alterations of metabolism, the oxidation process, which naturally occur in various circumstances

and cannot be regarded as the cause of a malady without rejection of the elementary principles of physiology. In the 19th century when the great doctor pronounced the diagnosis, it was absolute and final, for there was no available method of measuring the uric acid content of the blood. Precise determination of the blood uric acid level is comparatively simple today—and so is a bold holdover from the 19th century ventures to diagnose gout in our time.

That's why the phantom malady is so rare nowadays. If overeating, excessive consumption of beer, wine and liquor and sedentary habit or insufficient daily exercise were the cause or a predisposing cause of gout, as the old timers believed, it should be as common as luxuries purchased on the installment plan.

BOY SLAPS, ABUSES GIRL

IS NOT LIKELY TO CHANGE

The way a boy treats a girl before marriage is usually a preview of what is in store for her after marriage. A leopard never changes his spots. And when a boy mistreats a girl before they are married, what reason has she to expect a magical transformation afterward? This is why the girl who wrote the following letter should watch her step:

(Q) "My problem is about a boy. He is the same age as I, 19 years. We've gone with each other for three years. About two months ago, he started going with another girl. Yet he doesn't approve of my dating other boys. It seems to be jealousy. When I'm around him, he slaps me, swears, and blames me for telling his girls things I don't even know about. Science at Work

New York—(U.P.)—The American

Cancer Society hopes to get to the

bottom of whether smoking causes

lung cancer. It may be several years,

but the ACS may turn up with a

scientific answer. The conclusion,

yes or no, will be based on

reports of a survey of more than

100,000 American men between the

ages of 50 and 69.

The survey, now being under-

taken, is the largest and most

comprehensive ever taken of the

smoking habits of the American

male. It will be conducted by

volunteers of the society, who

will put the questions to rela-

tives, neighbors and close

friends. A follow-up survey will

be made at the end of one and

two-year periods to discover

whether the persons quizzed

have died or are still living.

Navy May Redesign

Big Supercarrier

Washington—(U.P.)—The Navy

has disclosed that it may re-

design its 60,000-ton supercarrier,

the USS Forrestal, to include a

radically new plane-launching

device developed in Britain.

Some U.S. experts believe the

British discovery will make it

possible to streamline the mas-

sive flight deck of the Forrestal,

now being built at Newport

News, Va.

ing areas. This would make it
