Special Easter season religious services will be observed by Chaplains Anderson and Cumisky. Beginning with Holy Thursday, Chaplain Anderson will have a communion service in the chapel at 10:30 a.m. At 8 p.m. there will be an Easter musical festival in the theater with the Apostolic Faith chorus and orchestra furnishing the music. On Good Friday, Chaplain Cumisky will preach at 7 p.m., with adoration and stations of the cross. Holy Saturday he will hear confessions throughout the day and evening. Easter Sunday there will be two masses, the first at 7 a.m., the second at 9 a.m.
