TAKE YOUR HUSBAND AS IS: HE'S TOO OLD FOR REFORM

(Q) "I have been married 40 years and here is my problem. I love my husband and he says he loves me but he drinks heavily at times, then he is mean to me. He won't eat after I prepare his supper and goes to bed or out town, growling. When we do go out together, he is always looking at other women, and saying nice things about them which makes me unhappy. How can I persuade him to quit drinking, being cranky and mean, and looking at other women?"

Mrs. D. B. (A) You are expecting a major change in a man who is approaching old age. Why not accept your husband as he is and try to be happy with him? He is too old now to change. If you have managed to stay in love with each other for 40 years, in spite of all your complaints against him, surely you should be able to put up with him for the years you have left together.

Of his faults, the one that stands out as most serious is your husband's drinking. This is what makes him cranky and mean to you and what leads to trouble between the two of you. If he drinks only occasionally, that is not too serious. But, as people grow older, drinking is likely to grow stronger and that is what you must try to prevent.

Keep a record of what has happened at home or in his work just before he starts to drink. If he is upset and unhappy about something that has happened,

then you know that he is likely to drink the next time things go wrong. Your job will then be to try to keep things from upsetting him.

Don't Fuss With Him

When he does drink, don't fuss with him. That will irritate him and cause him to be mean and disagreeable to you. Instead, be kind and try to divert his attention to something else so he will stop.

As for looking at other women, especially the pretty ones, every normal man does that until he becomes senile. Don't let it disturb you. Comment favorably about the pretty ones and take some of the wind out of your husband's sail. If he sees that he is not making you jealous or getting a rise out of you, he may stop some of his looking around or he may at least keep his observations to himself.

THE EVERREADY OPERATORS ARE UNTEACHABLE

Some readers are aware that this column has been at war with the ever-ready operators for years over the treatment of

hemorrhoids, hernia and infected tonsils. It seems that doctors who still use nineteenth century methods exclusively cannot or will not admit that newer knowledge and newer methods can be better.

Dr. Oliver Wendell Holmes, nearly a century ago, made him unpopular with the leaders, the authorities, etc., when he insisted that childhood fever was contagious—and implied, if he did not say that the obstetricians, midwives and nurse carried the disease from one patient to the next on their unclean instruments and hands. Boy, was Holmes a so-and-so—until the old timers died off and doctors with newer knowledge of obstetric aseptics took over.

If any reader is under the impression that I say the ambulant (injection) treatment of hernia (rupture, breach) or the office (injection) treatment of hemorrhoids (piles) or the diathermy (electro-coagulation) treatment of infected tonsils is applicable in all cases or that an operation is never necessary in any case, it will be unfortunate, for I do not say and never have said anything of the kind. We must face it: the knuckleheads do not always skip this column.

What I do say is that I want the twentieth century treatment if I were the patient with hernia, hemorrhoids or infected tonsils. Of course the treatment might fail to cure—but can any reputable surgeon guarantee that radical operation will cure? For me the modern method is the method of choice for three good reasons, namely—

1. Injection (ambulant) treatment of hernia or hemorrhoids or diathermy (electro-coagulation) treatment of infected tonsils does not require hospitalization.
2. The twentieth century methods have proved effective beyond the most vehement denials of the old timers.
3. Ambulant treatment is always SAFER than radical surgery.

The diathermy (electro-coagulation) treatment of infected tonsils is applicable in any case and indeed, it is sometimes the only alternative for tonsillectomy when the patient is a bad risk for the major operation.

Injection treatment is NOT applicable for external piles, only for internal, bleeding piles. Ambulant, office, injection treatment for hernia is NOT applicable in some cases, as Dr. Watson clearly explains in his classic on Hernia (3rd ed. Mosby Co., St. Louis). In more than 20,000 injections Watson had only 4 serious complications—these four patients were operated on and made uneventful recoveries.

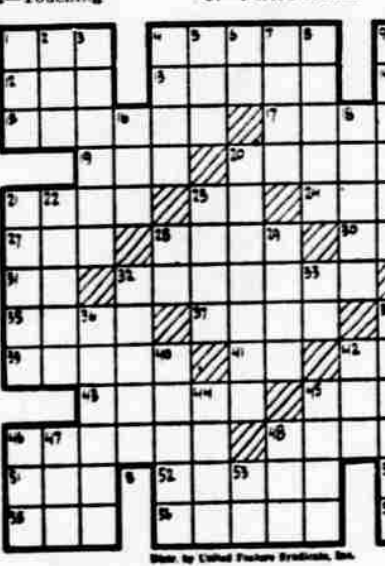
