Senator Discusses Oregon Finances At League Meeting

Financial reorganization of Oregon was discussed by State Senator Phil Hitchcock, Klamath Falls, at a meeting of Medford League of Women Voters held Saturday at the Jackson hotel. Mrs. H. S. Hinman, first vice-president, presided.

Mr. Hitchcock sketched briefly the simplicity of the state's financial and administrative pattern in earlier days and contrasted it with the complicated and expensive program of today. He stated that the change had been brought about partly by inflation and partly by increased services required of government by citizens of today.

State departments have grown in a sort of patch-work development, he said, with various departments being allowed to function independent of others even though the work they do overlaps. As an example of this, he cited the department of motor vehicles.

The "Little Hoover committee," appointed by act of the 1949 legislature, met throughout the year between legislative sessions and made definite recommendations regarding fiscal reorganization of the various departments of Oregon. Mr. Hitchcock said. These recommendations were embodied in HB 611, which set up a department of finance and administration responsible to the governor.

Mr. Hitchcock said some of the economies effected by the department include: controlling budgets of different departments and thereby equalizing salaries of employees; reducing number of state owned vehicles through organization of car pools; making utmost use of state printing office rather than allowing departments to hire outside firms on a non-competitive basis; setting up uniform accounting system for all departments; improving purchasing methods, done under complete inventory for entire state, and carried out by approved business methods.

Mr. Hitchcock concluded by saying that efficient methods may not bring 100 per cent efficiency in government, but it is the first step, and the second step is up to the voters who should see that qualified and competent people are put into office.

Mr. Hitchcock was introduced by Mrs. Ben Day, who later discussed some of the tax measures which will be on the November ballot.

Mrs. C. Reese Braley, chairman of the nominating committee, made her report and Mrs. Paul Janey reported on the proposed budget for the coming year.

Deposits and loans throughout the statewide banking system on March 31 were \$533,436,827 and \$277,042,952 respectively, and resources were \$578,560,387.

All figures represent increases over the same time last year.

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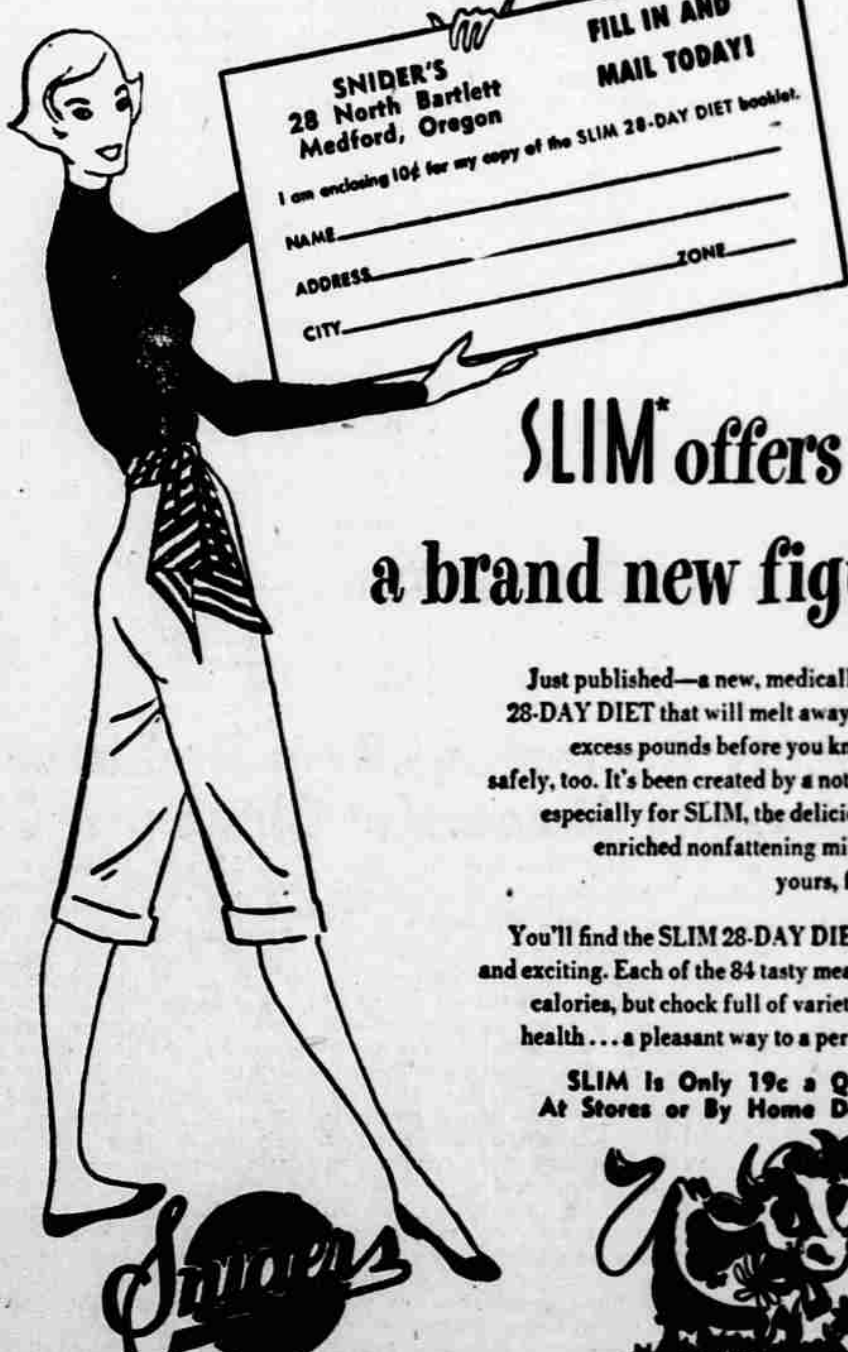
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
