Complaint in Damage Suit Seeks \$27,500

A civil suit requesting \$27,500 damages has been filed in circuit court by attorneys representing Rebecca White, according to records in the county clerk's office. Named as defendants in the complaint are Mr. and Mrs. Ernest G. Roseborough, 610 Oakdale drive.

The complaint alleges that the plaintiff suffered a broken hip as the result of a fall on May 18, 1951, while she was leasing a residence at 716 West Main street owned by Mr. and Mrs. Roseborough. In the complaint, she charges that her fall, at 704 West Sixth street, also owned by the Roseboroughs was due to their negligence in maintaining a ramp.

The complaint asks for \$25,000 for damages and \$2,500 for medical expenses. The plaintiff is represented by Roberts, Kelington and Branchfield, Medford firm of attorneys.
