Around Hollywood

Hollywood—(U.P.)—Ed Gardner moaned Wednesday his celebrated move to Puerto Rico to save income tax isn't the

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

It is Not-What You Eat
Please tell me what groceries to avoid because of chronic polyneuritis that is widespread throughout the United States. (Mrs. W. J.)
Answer—I used that language to tell about the frequency of North American beriberi (multiple or polyneuritis). It is not due to what you eat but rather to lack of what you don't get in such groceries as refined white flour, refined white sugar, refined white syrup, refined white (polished) rice and refined so-called breakfast foods, namely vitamin B. Best food sources of this is plain wheat from which nothing is removed.

Coffee and Health
Is coffee injurious to one's health? (Mr. W. A. T.)
Answer—It depends on one's age and some other factors. In booklet C V D, about heart and artery troubles, there is a short chapter on the value of coffee. In the booklet WHAT TO EAT AND WHY there are longer chapters about the effects of tea, chocolate or cocoa and coffee and how they enter the stomach—vitamin D and calcium, for instance.

Perhaps Dr. Brady would be kind enough to explain the difference between a capsule and a capsule. (A. W.)
Answer—A capsule is a soluble case for enclosing a dose of medicine. A capsule is a kind of coated capsule within another coated capsule to inclose two medicines which retain potency better if not actually mixed till they enter the stomach—vitamin D and calcium, for instance.

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
