D. Harvey, Medford civil engineer. The films, presented at the Jackson hotel with Carlos Morris handling the projector, depicted the strides made in harnessing the rivers of Afghanistan and transforming the deserts of that historic land into richly fruitful agricultural areas.

Morrison-Knudsen, the world's largest engineering firm, entered into the ambitious reclamation program under contract with the government of Afghanistan. One feature of the travelogue-type moving pictures was the quick adaptation of natives to the operation of modern mechanized construction equipment.
