Russ Reply to Big 3 Request Thought Made

Moscow—(U.P.)—Russia apparently has replied to a Western Big Three request for more information about her March 10 proposals for unification of Germany.

Foreign Minister Andre Vishinsky summoned U. S. Charge d'Affaires Hugh S. Cumming Jr., British Charge d'Affaires Paul Grey and French Ambassador Yves Chataigneau separately to the Kremlin Wednesday night and handed each of them a Soviet note.

The three western embassies refused to discuss the nature of the notes, but they were believed to be Russia's reply to separate U. S., British and French requests for clarification of the Soviet's German proposals.

Some 125 men walked out last Thursday demanding a 47½ cent raise.

Mill operators said work would not resume until Monday because part of the operation had been dismantled for repairs when the workers left their jobs.
