

Comment on Steel Mills' Seizure

Editorial comment on President Truman's seizure of the steel industry to ward off a nationwide strike by the United Steelworkers of America, CIO included:
NEW YORK DAILY NEWS—By this seizure, H. S. Truman performed an Adolf Hitler or Benito Mussolini in the allegedly anti-Nazi, anti-Fascist United States... He sprung this seizure after by-passing the Taft-

Hartley law, under which the strike could have been legally delayed for 80 days while the unions and companies bargained. He attempted to justify the grab under a vaguely asserted constitutional power to protect the national welfare... Truman won the first round. We shall see what we shall see in higher courts.

THE NEW YORK TIMES—It is obvious that if this order stands up in the federal courts we shall have entered a new era in which the... implied powers of the presidency go very far indeed. If the president can take over the steel industry, set the wages it shall pay and govern its right to pay dividends to its owners and interest to its creditors, he can of course do the same thing in the case of any other industry whose product bulks large in the national economy or is of importance to the national defense.

WASHINGTON POST—President Truman's seizure of the steel industry will probably go down in history as one of the most high-handed acts committed by an American president... **OREGON JOURNAL**—President Truman was right in seizing the steel industry to prevent the paralysis of production so vital to this country. He had no reasonable alternative.

Most companies are resuming operations under the presidential decree but some are taking their case to court. The U. S.

district court has denied a temporary injunction. The men are returning to work.
But it is a sad commentary on our labor relation and on our government that such a seizure ever was necessary.

A settlement could have been made between the steelworkers and the steel industry if there had been a better spirit of compromise. The steel industry is booming with both government and civilian orders and has been showing heavy profit.

PORTLAND OREGONIAN—President Truman's denunciation of the steel companies in his address accompanying the order to seize the plants in the government's name was arrogant, abusive and wholly unnecessary. The retiring president now can mark off his political debt to union labor "paid in full." But his caustic, unfair and misleading diatribe against the management of an industry on which rearmament and the nation's security are founded can only contribute to disunity and unease throughout the country.

The federal administration has no clear-cut authority, either under the constitution or statute, to take possession of the steel companies. The order is based on the president's proclamation of a national emergency, December 16, 1950, in relation to the war in Korea, and on the general powers of the presidency. The Smith-Connally act of World War II, which did give the president powers of seizure, has been repealed.

Congressional Quiz

Q—Can lobbyists go on the floors of the House and Senate?
A—Ordinarily, no. However, rules permit an ex-Senator to go on the upper chamber floor even if he is a lobbyist, although House rules bar ex-Representatives who are lobbyists. And Congressmen can ask for unanimous consent of their colleagues to allow a lobbyist on the floor. Sen. Spessard L. Holland, (D-Fla.), March 25 won such a nod from the Senate so a lobbyist registered for the National Association of Attorneys General could join him during the tide-lands oil debate.

Q—What is this "defense support" fund called for in the foreign aid bill?
A—It is a recommended \$1.8 billion to be used for raw materials, commodities and machinery for the 14 North Atlantic Treaty Organization nations. According to the Administration, it would provide "Europe with a critical margin of specific resources" in which it is deficient. Proponents say spending "key commodities" increases European defense capabilities by several times the value of the defense support.

Q—What's the status of the bill to ban liquor advertising on radio or TV?

A—The Senate Commerce Committee, after hearing testimony from backers and opponents of the bill, voted 8 to 7 March 26 against reporting it favorably to the Senate. Committee Chairman Edwin C. Johnson, (D-Colo.), sponsor of the bill, said he did not plan to bring up the issue again this year. At present radio and television networks accept advertisements for beer but not for liquor.

Q—How is Congress progressing in writing the year's appropriations bill?

A—Congress' 1952 check-writing work is far ahead of last year's. By the end of March the House had passed five of the 10 regular money bills. But only one had been passed by March 31, 1951. Appropriations bills always originate in the House. The current crop is to finance the government for the 12 months starting July 1.

Q—Is the Civil Aeronautics Board in favor of legislation to separate airlines' mail pay from their subsidies?

A—Donald W. Nyrop, CAB chairman, told House Commerce Committee hearings March 24 his agency favored separating mail pay from subsidy, but insisted the same standards should apply to domestic and international carriers. He opposed the part of the bill approved by the Senate last year specifying a different standard for paying overseas lines. He said the standard should determine the amount of mail pay and the amount of subsidy, if any, needed to assure a "fair return."

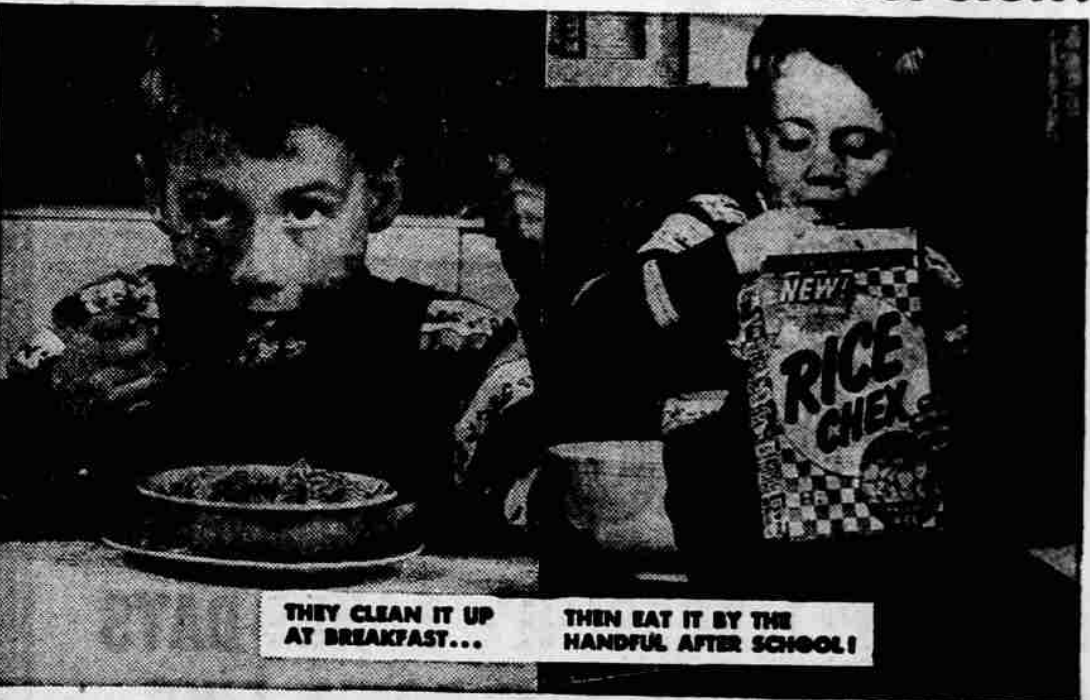

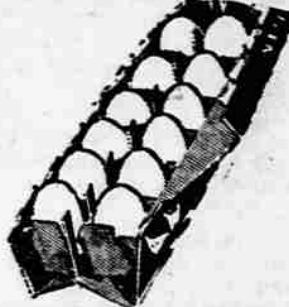
