Hilde Guiden, a slim soprano, frankly admits she's been earnestly copying American girls since she arrived.

"Before I came I thought typical American girls had long hair . . . to here," Hilde said, gesturing toward her shoulder. "The American girl tourists seem to have long hair always, so I tell my beauty operator in Vienna not to cut my hair, because I am going to America."

That was last October. Since then, the soprano has studied girls on subways, on Fifth avenue, in fashion magazines—and her hair is short, her eyebrows are growing out, her false eyelashes have been thrown away and her lipstick is applied to make her upper lip appear wider.
