Mrs. Goff's dress was of black and white and she wore a violet corsage.

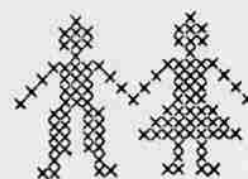
A small reception was given jointly by parents of the bride and bridegroom in the home of the bridegroom.

Before leaving Oakland the bride visited an aunt and cousins there.



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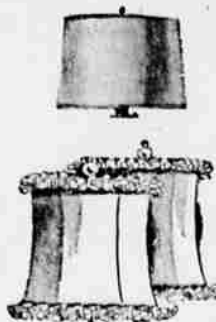
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
