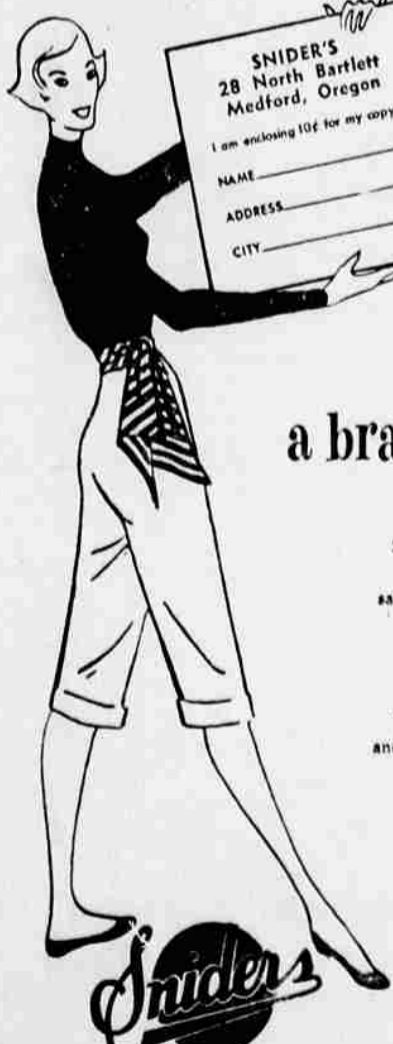
Mrs. Bernice Kunzman led the devotions using "Christian Opportunities for Work," as her topic.
