Mayor J. E. Brooks called City Attorney L. M. Mullens to prosecute a case in court.

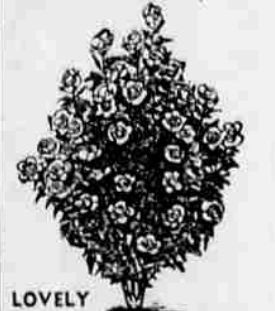
"I'll be there as soon as I can find a baby-sitter for my eight-month-old twins," Mullens said.

Overdose of Vitamin Pills Not Harmful

Buffalo, N. Y. — (UPI) — Keep medicines away from children's reach, but if junior playfully swallows a flock of vitamin pills, the chances are they'll do him no harm, says Dr. Niels C. Klendshoj of the Arner Co., pharmaceutical manufacturers. Dr. Klendshoj said the human body contains a mysterious but automatic safety valve for most vitamins. It prevents toxic, or poisonous effects from excess dosage.

The body will absorb only a certain amount of a vitamin and will throw off the remainder harmlessly, he said.

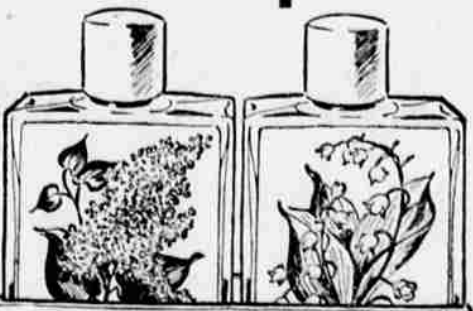
