Keyserling Terms Charges 'Nonsense'

Washington — (U.P.) — Government economist Leon H. Keyserling said Tuesday it is "utter nonsense" to claim that either he or his wife were ever Communists or pro-Communists.

Keyserling, now chairman of President Truman's Council of Economic Advisers, referred to a charge by Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis.) that witnesses before government panels have accused Mrs. Keyserling of once being a Communist and Keyserling himself of having pro-Red sympathies.

In a formal statement, he made a categorical denial of any such accusations.
