Pets in the Home
Make for Happy Kids

(Q) "I have three children, ranging in age from ten to five years. Our house is constantly filled with all kinds of pets. My son, the eldest, is forever bringing home mice, hamsters, birds, stray dogs and cats, or puppies and kittens given to him by some of his friends. He seems to love animals but I have the work of feeding them and cleaning up. Every time I say we will have to get rid of a pet, all three children put up such a protest that I haven't the heart to carry out my threat. I sometimes feel that I am living in a zoo instead of a home. Do children need pets?"

—Mrs. A. M.

(A) Every child needs a pet at some time or other in his childhood. Some children, however, need pets more than others do and they have a greater fondness for animals than for people.

A house filled with pets can be a nuisance and a lot of extra work. However, when children love animals, depriving them of the pleasure is unfair. It is better to have a house cluttered with pets and happy children than a neat and spotless home where the children are unhappy.

Your children are quite old enough to assume the major burden of caring for their pets. Make it clear to them that this is their duty and that if they shirk it, their pets will suffer just as they themselves would suffer if you neglected them.

You cannot, of course, expect them to use mature judgment in the care of their pets nor can

you expect them to be as consistent in the care of animals as an adult would be. There are times when you will have to take over to avoid the death of a pet that would bring grief to your children.

Not Too Important

While pets are important to a child, they should never be allowed to become so important that they will take the place of human companionship. When you find that your son, for example, is spending more time at home playing with his pets than out on the playground, playing with the boys, heed this as a "danger signal" and see what is causing it. Pets have their place in a child's life but that place is not to replace human companionship. The child never learns from animals how to adjust to living people and this is essential to success in life.

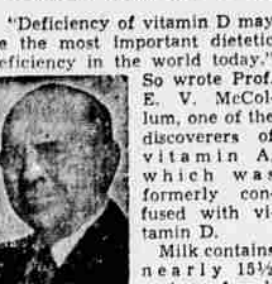

REFINED DIET, LEG CRAMPS AND GROWING PAINS

"Deficiency of vitamin D may be the most important dietetic deficiency in the world today."

So wrote Prof. E. V. McCollum, one of the discoverers of vitamin A, which was formerly confused with vitamin D.

Milk contains nearly 15 1/2 grains of calcium in the quart. Egg yolk, cheese, skim milk, buttermilk, cream, leafy vegetables, greens, beans, peas, peanuts and nuts are the richest food sources of calcium.

"The ordinary mixed diet of Americans and Europeans, at least among dwellers in cities and towns, is probably more often deficient in calcium than in any other chemical element." So wrote Prof. Henry C. Sherman, author of the famous textbook, *Chemistry of Food and Nutrition*.

I quote these two top authorities just to show that you have to sit up pretty late at night to prove I'm dreaming.

The diet of most Americans is dangerously restricted and nutritionally inadequate (apart from caloric values) by (1) their own whims or habits and (2) because of their childish faith in the spacious assurances of irresponsible food vendors.

One common manifestation of calcium and D deficiency is the complaint known as "growing pains" in children. Another is painful cramps in legs or feet, sometimes in wrists or arms, which occur usually in the night and to mature or elderly adults.

Mind, now, this is not to imply that a dose or two of calcium with or without vitamin D will dispel growing pains or nocturnal cramps.

The corrective treatment for either or both troubles is high calcium diet supplemented with an optimal daily ration of calcium and vitamin D.

Calcium alone is much less effective because vitamin D is essential for the assimilation,

utilization and retention of calcium.

Vitamin D steadily loses strength in contact with calcium, so the ideal way to take the two is in the form of a capsule—not capsule. A capsule is a capsule of calcium within another of D—so the two do not mix until the gelatin coatings or covers dissolved in stomach.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS
No. 100
Daughter, 8, round-shouldered, with protruding belly. What should I do to correct this? Will exercise help or will she have to wear a brace? (Mrs. T. L.)

Answer—Certain special exercises will help a great deal if the child practices them as your physician or physical therapist under the physician's employ teaches—the exercises are comparable with practicing piano or violin lessons. If your physician considers additional treatment necessary he may consult an orthopedic surgeon about it, but it would be a grave mistake to use any kind of brace or support without medical supervision.

Nitrogen
What part does nitrogen play in the chemistry of the body? (T. F.)

Answer—Food proteins, such as lean meat, egg, milk, cheese, fish, beans, peas, peanuts, nuts are nitrogen compounds. The protein (nitrogenous material) in these foods is essential for growth building and repair. Four fifths of the air we breathe is nitrogen, and in the gaseous form it is not utilized by man.

Garagegasm, What of the Monoxide?
I work in a garage and I wonder what ailments I might get from carbon monoxide. Only thing I have noticed is headache. (S. E. M.)

Answer—Don't think about it that way, Sam. If you have any complaints at all say nothing about them except to your doctor.
