

Tribute to Youth Planned May Day By Medford Elks

With the slogan "Make May Day American," the Medford lodge of Elks will sponsor a program in observance of Youth Day on May 1, according to Exalted Ruler V. Aubrey Norris, who announced Saturday that this is in compliance with a proclamation recently issued by Mayor D. L. Flynn.

"We join wholeheartedly in this move to make proper recognition of youth," Norris said. "Over-emphasis on juvenile delinquency, and the problems of youth generally, tend to make us forget the wonderful things that our young people are doing to help make ours a better city, state and nation. It's time that we took a look at youth's achievements, and encouraged them on the path of good citizenship."

The grand exalted ruler of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks has requested all subordinate lodges to participate in a nation-wide program on May 1. He asserted that "Elks are proud of America's youth for their devotion to liberty, justice and honor," and he said that May Day was an appropriate date to take recognition of them.

"While subversives stage noisy demonstrations for Communism's philosophy of regimentation, dictatorship and the destruction of human rights, let us join with Youth in a triumphant demonstration for American ideals which will inspire and encourage tomorrow's leaders to continue and increase their contribution to the preservation of our liberties," he said.

Norris reported that the program of the Youth Day celebration will begin at 8 p.m. in the Elks' temple, and that the boy and girl winner of the local Elks leadership contest will receive their awards. William McAllister Jr., Medford high school, and Marilyn Bohnert, of Central Point high school, are the winners.

Awards also will be given to the winners in the Most Valuable Student contest. These winners are: First place, Roy Rogers, Medford; second place, Neil Richardson, Central Point; third place, Sue Harris, Medford; and fourth place, Shirley Edison, Central Point.

Also on the program will be students who were elected and who served as junior city administration officials in January. The Medford high school orchestra will provide the music for the entertainment, and the parents of the students and the public are invited.

Manville's 8th Wife Killed in Car Crash

Scarsdale, N. Y. —(U.P.)— Mrs. Georgina Campbell Manville, 33, eighth wife of asbestos heir Tommy Manville, was killed Saturday when the automobile she was driving collided with another car at an intersection.

The blue-blooded British beauty was thrown from her automobile and pinned beneath the left front wheel by the impact of the collision with a car driven by William H. Rogers, White Plains, N. Y. She was dead when medical aid arrived, police reported.

Police roused Manville from sleep at his nearby 28-room mansion to notify him of his wife's death.

The Manvilles were legally separated and Manville was paying her a separate maintenance of \$1,000 a month.

King Hospital Interne Adjudged Psychopath

Seattle —(U.P.)— A King county hospital interne accused of raping a young polio patient has been adjudged a sexual psychopath.

Dr. Roy B. Patton, 29, was ordered committed to Western State hospital at Sedro Woolley by Superior Judge Harold A. Seering. Prosecutor Charles O. Carroll said Patton would still face a rape charge when and if he was released from the hospital.

Patton had been charged with raping a paralyzed 22-year-old mother in her hospital bed last year.

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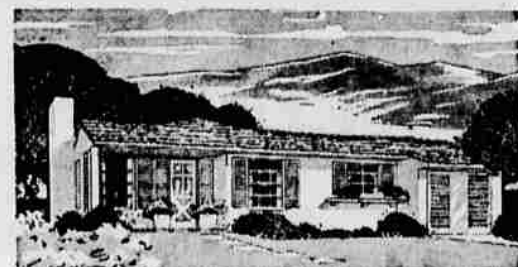
