vince himself that what he has is just right and he is happy that things are as they are.

The discontented person, by contrast, is never really happy. He is always looking at the grass on the other side of the fence and thinking how much greener it is than his own. Naturally, under such conditions, he cannot be content with his grass.

But, unless his discontent becomes so strong that it overpowers him and defeats him from the start, he has a strong incentive to make his grass as green as the grass on the other side of the fence. That is good because only through persistent striving and hard work can success be attained.

Your goal, as is true of everyone, should be to be reasonably content. This is essential if you are to be happy. And, you can achieve this contentment if you are a realist about your abilities and do not make the mistake of hitching your wagon to a star.

Letters-Writing: "Why is it that so many people find it hard to sit down and write letters? As a result, they are poor correspondents with their families as well as their friends."

(A) Poor correspondents are generally victims of psychological stumbling blocks built up in childhood. When they were young, they got the idea that letter-writing was a hard and difficult job, as it usually is for a young child. But, instead of outgrowing or discarding this idea as they grow older, they have clung to it. Consequently, they shy away from the job of writing as long as they possibly can. Once they settle down to writing a letter, they are usually amazed at how easy it is after all.

Sloppiness: "My 16-year-old daughter is very careful about her appearance whenever she goes out but, at home, she wears any old clothes, doesn't bother to fix her hair, and is generally sloppy. The more my husband and I talk to her about this, the sloppier she is. What can we do about this?"

(A) Stop nagging about your daughter's sloppiness. Your nagging, I am sure, is partially responsible for making her as sloppy as she is. She is using this as a method of asserting her independence. You must not, however, allow her to get the idea that she can be as sloppy as she wishes at home. This is bad for her morale and for that of the whole family. Set definite rules about what may and may not be worn at different times and in different parts of the house. For example, a neat dress, shoes, and well-brushed hair should be required for the family dinner. If your daughter does not wish to dress properly, do not let her come to the family table and do not provide food for her to eat in her room or in other parts of the house. Once she sees you are serious, she may mend her ways.

Fault-Finding: "My husband never found fault with what I did before we were married. Now he finds fault with everything. Why?"

(A) It is possible that you were on your toes before you were married more than you are now? Are you conscious of being less careful and precise about what you do than you were before marriage? That may be the answer to your question. It is also possible that your husband is not so blinded by love now as he was before marriage and can, therefore see faults that he formerly overlooked.
