## Ancient Abbey To Be Restored

Restoration of the Abbey of St. Matthew of the Benedictine Convent just outside of Trier, Germany, is nearing completion, it is reported. The basilica of this world renowned cloister contains the only tomb of an Apostle north of the Alps. The monk's cells and the Abbey Chapel have been completed.

The most difficult task, underway at present, is the restoration of the dormitory, a three-nave Gothic hall which is considered the largest and most beautiful of such early Gothic structures, and has been described in art history as the most magnificent interior hall of this era in all Europe.

The damaged frescoes are being restored by an expert of the Cologne "Dom-Bauhuette."

The bottom of a pressing iron sometimes gets a little rough. To make it smooth, rub vigorously with salt dampened in cold water and applied with waxed paper.

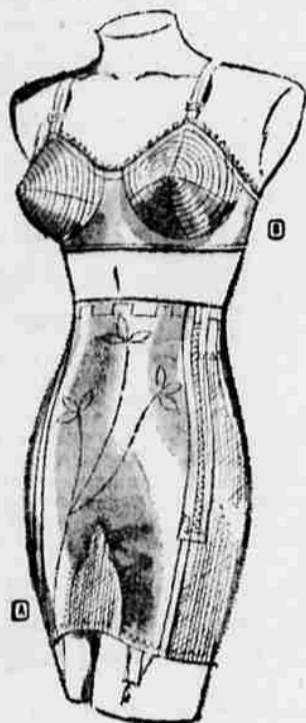

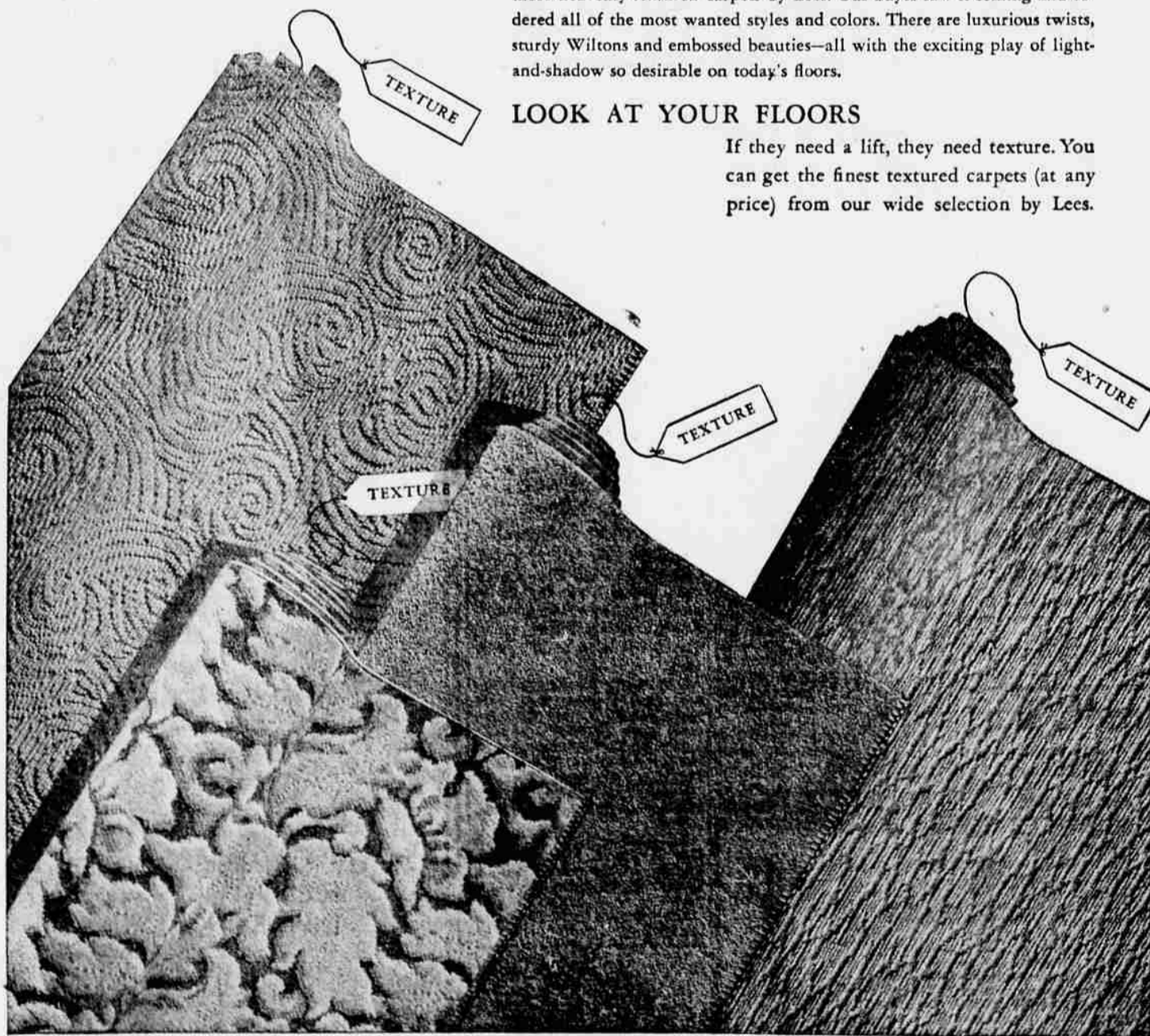
