Chauffeur Service Takes Drunks Home

Sydney, Australia — (U.P.) — Three Sydney business men have opened a hire-chauffeur service to drive home drunken, or near-drunken motorists.

The service, known as the Road Safety Drivers' Co., has been stated by a city car park owner, a salesman and a mechanic.

A team of eight experienced drivers will be available from 9 p.m. Saturdays till 5 a.m. Sundays to drive motorists home from night clubs, parties or celebrations.

The service will charge £1 (\$2.25) for the hire of the chauffeur, plus 2/6 (about 28¢) a mile from the pickup point to the motorist's home.

The chauffeur will take the motorists home, garage his car, give him his keys, let him in the front door and if necessary, put him to bed.
