Medford Hotel Obtains Remodeling Permit

Owners of the Medford hotel, 408 West Main street, have obtained an \$8,900 building permit for remodeling of the lobby of the building, according to records on file in the city building department.

Harry Watson, manager of the hotel, said the permit includes removal of decorative wood in the lobby, lowering of ceilings and redecoration with plaster and wood. The project, part of an overall remodeling of the hotel, is expected to be completed about June 15, he said.

Remodeling of the lobby will complete about half of the projected modernization of the hotel, Watson stated. The hotel lounge, registration desk and front exterior are also scheduled for remodeling in the near future. Remodeling of the exterior will include resurfacing with plaster and marble, the manager stated.

Hatchet Killer Pays For Murder in 1950

Lincoln, Neb. — (U.P.) — Bible-reading Roland D. Sundahl walked calmly to his death in the electric chair Wednesday for the hatchet murder of a teen-age car hop.

Sundahl, the 21-year-old father of two, was pronounced dead at 12:07 a.m. (CST) after 2:50 volts of electricity surged through his body.

His death ended pleas for commutation of his sentence which had set back his execution date four times since he was convicted of murdering Bonnie Lou Merrill, 18, of Silver Creek, Neb., in 1950.

The state pardon board ruled against commuting Sundahl's sentence to life imprisonment 11 days ago and closed his last avenue of hope.

Young Marine Cited For Reckless Driving

Donald Fred Patterson, 1518 Bryant street, a 19-year-old Marine, was fined \$10 yesterday in police court on a charge of reckless driving, city police said today. Officers stated that Patterson was the driver of a car which struck a fence owned by Cal-Ore Machinery company, 944 South Central avenue, and overturned at about 2 a.m., yesterday.

About 30 feet of wire fence was knocked down in the accident, according to police records, and some damage was reported to the car. Patterson was not injured, officers said. No other vehicles were involved in the accident.

Oregon Generous, CARE Man Reports

Portland — Oregonians contributed \$755,399 for CARE food packages and other supplies in the past six years, it was reported today by the Rev. Gilbert B. Christian, Oregon CARE director.

The six-year anniversary of CARE is next month, and Mr. Christian reported that during this time Americans have ordered 11,000,000 CARE packages for needy people in Europe, the Near East and Asia. They have included food, clothing material, blankets, wool, household linen, soap, coal, plows, agricultural tools and books.

Nearly 76,000 of these packages were ordered by Oregon people.

CARE packages are still available. Mr. Christian's report pointed out, ranging in price from \$4 to \$18.75.

Power Shortage Seen In Winter Months

Seattle — (U.P.) — Defense Electric Power Administrator James Fairman forecasts another "tight" winter in national power supplies despite the fact the nation's generating capacities will be increased "considerably."

Fairman told delegates at the annual convention of the American Public Power association Tuesday night that power suppliers predict an increase of 9,000,000 kilowatts in power demands by next December. This would be 13 per cent more than present power facilities produce.

The DEPA chief said installation of new generating capacity almost will be enough to meet the demand. However, he added that the equipment for nearly 3,000,000 kilowatts of new generation may not be delivered until 1953.

Shady Cove Man Hurt

Shady Cove — Lester Lowery, 18, Shady Cove, received a flesh wound in the shoulder yesterday afternoon when his gun accidentally discharged, it was reported by sheriff's deputies. Lowery was on his way to target practice when the accident happened.

The wound was not serious, and Lowery was said to be in good shape after receiving treatment by a doctor.
