Two Portlanders Die In Traffic Accidents

Two Portland residents met death Tuesday, one in a fishing accident while the other died from injuries received in an automobile accident.

Rose Irene Douglas was found in an overturned car in the Salmon river about two miles south of Wemme.

State Police said the car apparently went out of control and plunged into the river when it was driven out of a parking area where the occupants had stopped to fish.

Portland's 21st traffic fatality was recorded with the death of 76-year-old William Lyons, Portland.

He died from injuries suffered when struck by a car driven by James L. Phelan, 26. Police said Lyons was jaywalking against traffic signals.

Pilot Takes to River To Miss U.S. Capitol

Washington — (U.P.) — Cmdr. William L. Martin plunged his Navy Hellicat fighter plane into the Potomac River Tuesday night to avoid crashing in the capital.

The 42-year-old flier suffered a broken shoulder, lacerations and shock. He was taken to the Naval Medical Center in nearby Bethesda, Md., after treatment at Alexandria, Va., General hospital.

Martin, who served aboard the carrier Enterprise during World War II, was hauled from the water shortly after he dived into the river.

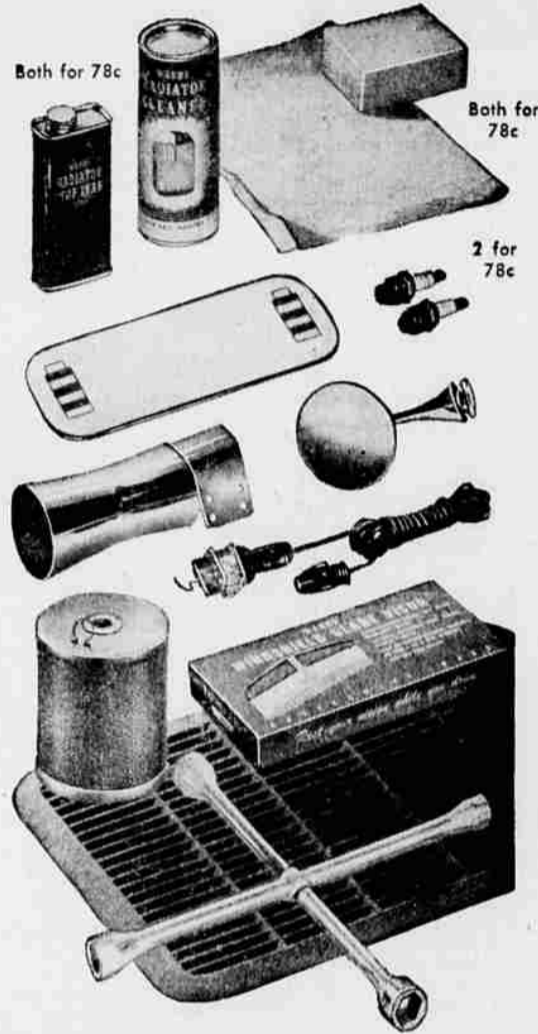

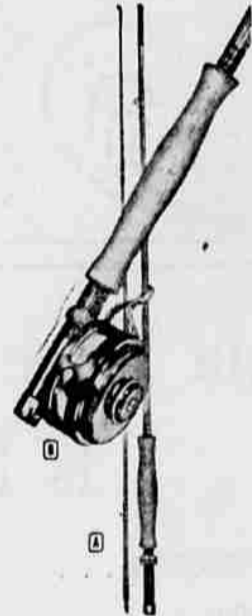
