## Archeologists Mapping Out Mexican Animal Graveyard

Tepepan, Mexico — (U.P.) — Archeologists are mapping out new excavations in a prehistoric animal graveyard in search of more evidence that the "first" Americans roamed the jungles here 12,000 years ago.

They hoped to find weapons or actual remains of primitive hunters who fought giant elephants and saber-tooth tigers in the valleys of Mexico before the dawn of civilization. First proof that man existed in the Western Hemisphere at the same time as the prehistoric animals was uncovered here.

Seattle — (U.P.) — Milk prices in western Washington were reduced one-half cent a quart Thursday, Frank Bird, secretary of the Seattle Dairy Foundation, announced.

Prices now will be the same as they were last December 1, he said. The per-quart price will be 22 cents if delivered to homes, and about a cent less if purchased in grocery stores.
