

Rogue Fishing Season Opens on Saturday

Portland — (U.P.) — A second trout opening season in Oregon occurs Saturday for anglers in the Rogue, Umpqua and eastern Oregon waters.

Cascade mountain lakes and reservoirs, with a few exceptions remain closed until May 30. Cascade water opening Saturday are Odell, Crescent, Blue and Suttle lakes and Wickiup reservoir.

Road Under Water

The State Fish and Game commission advised anglers going to the Wickiup reservoir that the main Pringle Falls road is under water and they will have to turn east from the main road near the left end of the Pringle Falls bridge and proceed to the upper end of the reservoir.

Game commission agents have been operating eight liberation trucks throughout the state, releasing 725,000 of the total 2,000,000 yearling trout raised this year.

Portland — (U.P.) — The State Game commission Friday issued the following report on fishing conditions in Oregon for the weekend.

Southwest: Spring chinook salmon fishing poor in the lower Umpqua; coastal lakes yielding a few limit catches; recent rains have caused most streams to be roily so it is believed that water conditions will not be good for the coming week-end.

Lakes Open

Central: The only lakes and reservoirs open in this area are Suttle, Blue, Odell and Crescent lakes and Ochoco and Wickiup reservoirs; all roads in fair to good condition to most sections of the Deschutes river, lower little Deschutes, Fall river, Tumalo creek, Metolius river, Crooked river, Ochoco reservoir,

Suttle lake, Odell lake east resort only, and Crescent lake.

The little Deschutes road closed above emigrant crossing because of deep snow; the Little Deschutes is high and over banks and the Deschutes from Wickiup to Bend is high and murky but in fair condition.

Fall river is excellent and clear; Deschutes below Bend is above normal but fishing conditions are good.

Hatchery Designs Given Approval By Game Group

Portland — (U.P.) — The Game Commission Friday said it has given its approval to U.S. Army engineer designs for the Leaburg trout hatchery to be built below Leaburg diversion dam on the McKenzie river.

Col. T. H. Lipscomb, Portland district engineer, announced that hatchery construction is to begin this June.

Larger Than Others

The Leaburg trout hatchery will be larger than any of the game commission's present 15 hatcheries. Production schedules call for the annual rearing of 500,000 yearling trout and 417,000 fingerling trout.

All fish produced at the Leaburg hatchery will be stocked in the Willamette river basin to offset trout population losses brought about under the Willamette Valley project which includes Detroit, Lookout Point, Dorena and Cottage Grove reservoirs and Dexter and Big Cliff reregulating dams.
