Phoenix Wins County B School Track Meet

Rogue River high nabbed the most first places but Phoenix gained the championship trophy Friday in the annual Jackson county B high school track and field meet at the Medford high stadium.

Phoenix won only two firsts, while Rogue River took nine, but piled up sufficient places for other points to outscore the Chieftains 83½ to 70 in the four school ruckus. Jacksonville scored 31½ and Talent 12. Phoenix and Rogue River entered the largest squad.

Rogue River had one triple winner, Ray Hiner, who copped both dashes and the broad jump. He was also on Rogue River's winning relay team. Jim Boulter of the Chiefs took both hurdles and was on the relay team. He tied for first with Byron Kile of Rogue River in the high jump. Shaw in the quarter-mile and Hunt in the half-mile won other Chief firsts.

Bean Wins Mile
Norm Bean, Phoenix, running for the first time this season, and without previous workout, was

second in the mile. Bohn grabbed the other Phoenix first in the pole vault.

Don Clay was a double winner for Jacksonville in the shot put and javelin and Ron Craig, Jacksonville, won the discus. Phoenix accumulated 10 seconds, four thirds, seven fourths, a tie for second and third, and four fifths while Rogue River picked up two seconds, two thirds, four fourths and four fifths.

The meet was a prelude to the District No. 3B track meet which will be held here next Saturday.

Oregon State Takes Lead

Moscow, Ida.—(U.P.)—Oregon State college grabbed first place in the Northern Division baseball race Friday by trouncing a slumping University of Idaho team 16 to 5.

The Beavers, tied with Oregon with a 4-2 record before the contest, slammed out 18 hits off four Idaho pitchers and clinched the win with a nine-run second inning. A two-run homer by Catcher John Thomas highlighted the outburst.

OSC left fielder Duane Helbig contributed to a flurry of extra base blows by hitting two triples and two doubles in five trips. Freshman Chuck Fisk, the division's leading batsman, collected 3 for 6 for the Beavers.

The loss dropped Idaho into the cellar.

Seattle.—(U.P.)—Five meet records were broken and one tied Saturday as the University of Washington swept to an overwhelming 88½ to 42½ victory over Idaho in a Northern division Pacific Coast conference dual track meet here.
