

HILL GAIL TRIUMPHS IN KENTUCKY DERBY

Louisville, Ky. — (U.P.) — Calumet Farm's Hill Gail, a barrel-chested beauty from the Blue Grass with lasting speed to burn, roared to a record-smashing triumph in the 78th Kentucky Derby Saturday as 110,000 frenzied fans cheered his dash into the turf's hall of fame.

Off on top in his bid to rewrite the record books, the dark bay son of Bull Lea took the lead as they left the gate, relinquished it and then—under the urging of little Eddie Arcaro—blasted out

on top and won despite the frantic finishing drive of Dixiana Farm's Sub Fleet.

It was a day for the books, under a perfect blue sky and over a lightning fast track, as the Calumet colt covered the mile and a quarter distance in 2:01 3/5 seconds, just one-fifth of a second off the track record hung up by his stablemate, Whirlaway in 1941.

For this was a record fifth win for Calumet as Hill Gail, who returned \$4.20, \$4.00 and \$3.20, pounded down that final stretch of light tan track, and it meant that he had beaten the bugaboo which bested a great stable of a former era—that of Col. E. R. Bradley.

And there were two other records at stake as, six lengths on top when they turned for home, he started racing through the tunnel of screams. It seemed a question of whether he might be caught by the onrushing Sub Fleet. But Hill Gail hung gamely on, with Arcaro flailing away up there on his neck, to finish two lengths on top.

So Arcaro, the swarthy little man from Cincinnati, racked up his record fifth win in the Rose run—breaking his own mark—and gave a record sixth win to Trainer Ben Jones.

Pelicans Split Twinbill With Black Tornado Nine

The Medford high baseball team completed its official district season unbeaten but suffered its first loss of the year to a high school opponent yesterday by splitting a doubleheader at Klamath Falls.

Medford won the first fracas 9 to 6 and lost the other to the Pelicans 3 to 2. The first encounter was a regular district scuffle, completing the four-game conference slate, while the second was a five-inning king's-x affair.

The Tornadoes hopped to a quick lead with four runs in the first inning on a double by Ned Landers, single by Ted Landers, three bases on balls and a wild

pitch. Klamath romped back in the second with three counters on singles by Lundsten and Gilmore, a double by Hannon, a base on balls, a hit batter and a fielder's choice.

Pels Catch Up
In the third Medford stretched its lead to 6 to 3 with two runs on singles by Terry Maddox and Derald Wooton and an error. Klamath sliced the gap to 6 to 4 with a run in the bottom of the third stanza. Two walks, Gilmore's double and an error turned the trick.

The Pelicans caught up at 6 to 6 in the fourth frame on singles by Owings and Lundsten, three walks, a wild pitch and a stolen base.

Terry Maddox was called to replace Lloyd Hart on the mound for Medford. With two runs in, the bases loaded and two men out, Maddox fanned Dexter to retire the side. No Klamathite got on base in the next three innings.

Cook Triples
Medford scored two in the fifth on singles by Maddox, Wooton and Dale Cook, two stolen bases, a walk and a hit batter.

The ninth run came in the seventh inning on Curt Holzgang's single and Cook's triple.

In the final Medford got two first-inning runs on a walk, Ned Landers' triple and a groundout. Klamath got all its runs in the fourth. Owings and Flochini singled and a hit batter and error aided the cause.

The defeat was Medford's second of the season. The previous loss was to the University of Oregon Jayvees.

Five Dodgers Among Loop Bat Leaders

New York — (U.P.) — The Brooklyn Dodgers' fast start in the National League race this season can be attributed to their re-found batting power, official statistics have revealed.

Five members of the Dodgers' "hit parade" are found in the National League's leading hitters, including Jackie Robinson, who took over the league leadership during the past week.

Robinson had boasted 14 hits in 33 times at bat, including afternoon games of Thursday, May 1. That gave the slugging second baseman an average of .42.

But Robinson wasn't doing all the hitting for the Flatbush crew. Third baseman Billy Cox was winning along with a .377 average, right fielder Carl Furillo had a .366 mark, catcher Roy Campanella was hitting .349 and center fielder Duke Snider rounded out the league's "big 10" with a .340 mark.

Rookie Toby Atwell of the Chicago Cubs was Robinson's closest rival with an impressive .387 average, while teammate Frankie Baumholtz was close behind at .386. Other leading hitters were Walker Cooper of the Braves, .378; Ted Kluszewski of the Reds, .370, and Red Schoendienst of the Cardinals, last week's leader, .340.

In the American League, outfielder Edmer Valo of the Philadelphia Athletics was the surprise leader with 16 hits in 39 appearances for a .410 average.

Gerry Coleman left the New York Yankees for the Marine Corps with a .405 average, while Floyd Baker of the Washington Senators, Pat Mullin of Detroit and Ed Stewart of the Chicago White Sox tied for third at .385.

Rounding out the American League's top 10 were Frank Campos of the Senators, .381, Hector Rodriguez of the White Sox, .375; Vern Stephens of the Red Sox, .355; Marty Marion of the Browns and Al Rosen of the Indians, both .348.

Bob Cain of the St. Louis Browns was the American League's best pitcher with a record of three victories in his first three starts. Gerry Staley of the Cardinals topped the National League hurlers with a 4-0 record.

Engineers Report Good Fish Luck At Dorena Dam

Portland — (U.P.) — In an effort to put a damper on reports that flood control reservoirs aren't good for fish life, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers reported Saturday that more than 1,000 fishermen are having good luck every weekend at Dorena dam, 22 miles southeast of Eugene, Ore.

The Engineers report that the average trout caught measures between 10 and 14 inches long and weighs about a pound. It says that limit catches are the rule rather than the exception.

1950 Stock
The Oregon Game Commission reports that the rainbow trout being caught in the lake formed by damming the Row river are part of the stock of 200,155 two to four-inch class rainbows planted in the reservoir in 1950.

The commission first poisoned the water in the reservoir to kill off existing "trash" fish before the game fish were planted.

The lake has an 18-mile shoreline and the engineers report that the average weekend will see 50 boats on the water and the dam-tender at Dorena reports between 750 and 800 automobiles are accommodated on Saturdays and Sundays, most of them from the Eugene area.

Oakland, Calif. — (U.P.) — Herman Reich, who grounded into a triple play in the 12th inning, drove home Portland's winning run in the 16th Saturday as the Bevos measured Oakland, 7-6, before 3,308 fans.

The wild, four hour and 21 minute contest called on the services of 11 pitchers. Portland picked up 15 hits, tabbing the loss on rookie Charley Oubre, who took over in the 16th. Red Lynn, fifth of the Portland flingers, was credited with the victory.

Portland — (U.P.) — Lewis & Clark's sensational freshman Caley Cook, won four events and set two meet records Friday in leading his Pioneer teammates to a 74-57 victory over University of Portland in a dual track meet here.

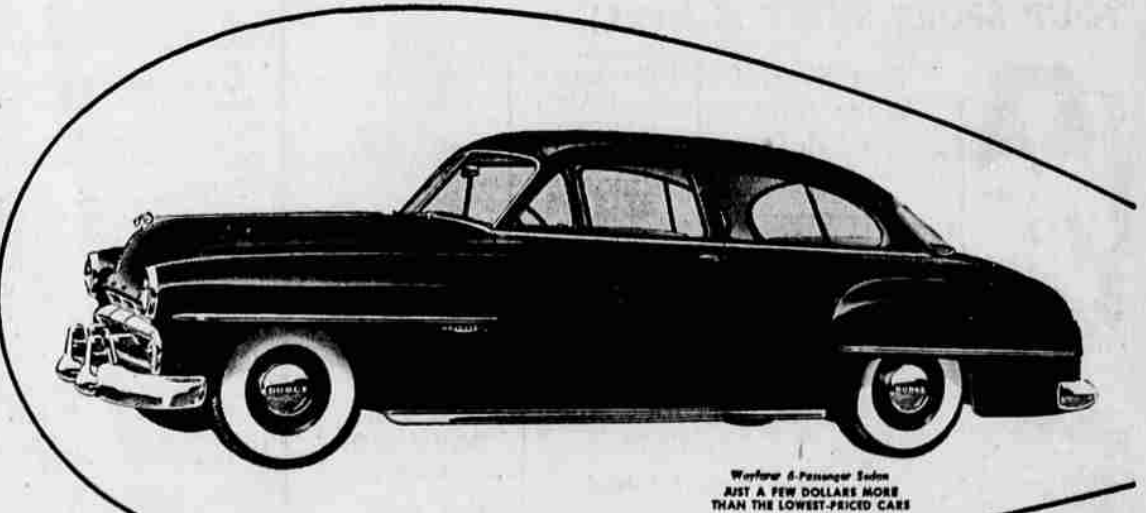

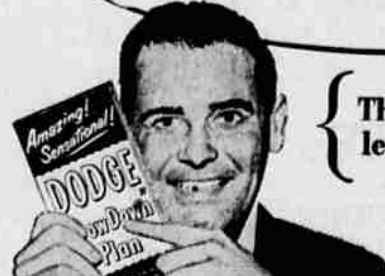
