Better Season For Minor Leagues Seen This Year

Columbus, Ohio — (U.P.) — President George M. Trautman said Saturday that early attendance reports indicate minor league baseball leagues should have a better season in 1952 than in 1951.

He also warned officials to guard against the "gambling" evil.

"In spite of poor weather conditions in some places, attendance reports generally are good and if these early reports are indicative of things to come, baseball in the National Association should enjoy a season this year much improved over 1951," he told club and league presidents.

Trautman said that new opening attendance highs were set by clubs in the American Association, Texas League, Big State League, Longhorn League, KOM League, Eastern League, Georgia State League, Pioneer League and Evangeline League. The "fine turnouts" were attributed to good weather, crowd appeal of baseball and the hard work of baseball officials.

Club and league presidents were warned to be "on the alert and guard against even a suspicion of the gambling evil in baseball" such as has dogged the heels of college basketball.

Recent indictments in other fields should be sufficient warning to all of us in baseball to exercise eternal vigilance," he said.

ACE Relinquishes Task of Cleaning College Sports

Chicago — (U.P.) — The American Council on Education has relinquished the task of trying to clean up college sports.

By a vote of 20 to 16, ACE officials voted Friday to abandon its special athletic committee and return the job of controlling college athletics to the various conferences.

The committee, which uncovered a need for cleaning up intercollegiate sports last December, was voted out of action by the ACE's athletic section.

President John Hannah of Michigan State College gave solid backing to the move.

Hannah said that he would "like to see the NCAA take the challenge which has been thrown to them."

He felt that the Big Ten and other conferences should "do the same."

"I'd like to see them given a year or two or three to work it out."

"If at the end of that time the situation remains the same, then the ACE can come back in the picture and tackle it as a completely new problem."

NCAA's President Hugh Willitt complained that college presidents were backward in lending a hand to the cleanup program.

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Building Permits

Totaling \$717,000 Issued in Quarter

The Medford city building department granted 237 permits for new construction and remodeling valued at approximately \$717,000 during the first four months of 1952, records showed Saturday. The total includes permits for 61 new residences within the city limits through April 30.

Permits granted in April numbered 68 valued at \$180,880 compared with 60 for \$230,879 in April, 1951, and 61 for \$145,870 in April, 1950. Two permits, for construction of the \$70,000 Medical Center building, and a \$30,000 remodeling project at the Medford Center building, were responsible for the larger total in April, 1951.

Permits granted last month included 11 for new residences valued at \$91,300; 27 for remodeling and repair of residences, totalling \$22,815; 1 for a new duplex valued at \$11,000; 4 new private garages valued at \$2,000; 6 for remodeling and repairing of business buildings totalling \$20,700; 2 for new church buildings valued at \$31,000, and 7 for other minor buildings totalling \$2,045.

Chain Store Founder Visits Here Briefly

J. J. Newberry, founder of the national chain of variety stores, made his first visit to the Medford Newberry store Saturday afternoon. Newberry, a resident of Englewood, N. J., was accompanied here by his wife.

"It isn't often that I get to visit many of the stores," Newberry said, "but this trip I am visiting the Medford and Klamath Falls stores for the first time."

He said that the Newberry chain now included 480 stores in 45 states. The chain store owner said that he had passed through the Rogue River valley several times before at night-time while riding on the train.
