Several Pre-School Clinics Announced In Valley Soon

A number of schools in Medford and surrounding communities are holding the annual pre-school clinics and "summer roundups" within the next week or two, for children who will enter school next fall.

Following are details on several which were announced yesterday:

WASHINGTON school, Tuesday, May 13, at 1 in the afternoon in the school gymnasium. A movie will be shown and special treats passed out.

LINCOLN school, Wednesday, May 14, at 1 in the afternoon. Arrangements have been made for the Kenwood bus No. 102 to pick up parents and children of the district. The bus will leave the school at noon. A film will be shown and refreshments served.

JACKSON school, Thursday, May 15, from 9 to 11 o'clock in the morning. Mrs. Donald Kent, chairman, has full information, and may be reached at telephone 3-1834. Jackson PTA members are sponsoring the roundup, and are anxious for a 100 per cent response from pre-school children.

PHOENIX school, Monday, May 15, in Phoenix Community building. Appointments may be arranged by calling Mrs. Charles Hoey at 2-2188. All children who will be six years old on or before November 15 are eligible to enter school this fall, but those who become six between then and January 1 may take examinations to determine their readiness for school of parents desire. Arrangements for such an examination may be made by calling E. R. James, Phoenix school superintendent.

TALENT school, Tuesday, May 20, starting at 9:30 in the morning, in the school music room. Appointments may be made by telephoning Ashland 2-3244.

All examinations will be conducted by physicians and public health nurses, and all children who are ready for school in the fall should attend for the free physical examinations, those in charge said.

Most of the clinics are under the joint sponsorship of the schools and the Parent-Teacher associations.

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As We Live

SMAL FIBS DON'T COUNT? THAT'S WHAT YOU THINK!

You may say that a fib doesn't count or that getting away with not paying your fare on the bus, subway, or trolley is too trivial to count but is it? Have you ever realized that little dishonesties soon turn into big ones unless you watch your step.

Without realizing it, your moral sense becomes dulled if you find that you can get away with those petty dishonesties. Your conscience is not as alert as it should be and you do not think minor dishonesties are serious.

But the world does not judge them as such nor do you win favor among your friends and acquaintances, even if you think they have not found you out. The chances are that they see and hear more than you think they do.

Take the matter of the little fib you thought no one noticed. No eyebrows were raised and no one challenged your statement. So, you conclude that no one noticed that your statement was not true. Had you ever thought that they might be too polite to challenge you, especially as the matter was a trivial one, but that does not mean that they did not make a mental note of the affair which is bound to color their opinion of you.

There are times when not telling the exact truth may seem justified because you want to save the feelings of someone else. But, wouldn't you feel better if you didn't say anything than if you said something you knew was untrue? Only when you are forced, point-blank, for a statement, is there any real excuse for saying something that is untrue and which you do intentionally to save the other person's feelings.

Then the matter of not paying your fare on the bus should not be overlooked. Of course the bus company will not go into bankruptcy because you did not pay your fare nor will you become a millionaire by pocketing the money that rightfully is not yours. But you may bankrupt your morals unless you allow your conscience to send you to the driver with your fare in hand.

It is bad enough to do dishonest things, but it is even worse to boast about them. That is what so many people do. When you boast, you are actually convincing yourself that your dishonesty was not dishonest at all. But, many people will not agree with you and their opinions of you will sink near the zero point when they hear you.

Working Wife: "When a wife works, should she keep her earnings for herself or should she contribute to the home?"

(A) When a wife works, there is no reason for her to feel that her earnings are her own, any more than her husband's are entirely his. The right kind of wife would not feel that way. If she is working to make two ends meet, of course she contributes all of her earnings. If, however, the husband is capable of supporting the home without help from his wife, and if the wife is working because she enjoys it, some of her earnings should be hers, to do with as she pleases. Most wives, however, spend the major part of their earnings for things for the home they could not otherwise have or they save it for emergencies.

Foreign parents: "Why is it that parents who came from a foreign country, even when they were little children, are much stricter with their own children than parents who have lived all their lives in America?"

(A) As a nation, we are less strict with our children than any nation in the world. Our whole philosophy of child rearing is different than that of other countries. When parents are foreign born, even if they came to America as children, they were brought up by parents who had the philosophy of child rearing of their own countries. It takes several generations to Americanize people. This is one illustration of how much influence people bring from their native lands and how hard it is for them to shake it off.

Doctor and Associates Slated for Sentencing

Portland — (U.P.) — Judge Martin W. Hawkins will sentence Dr. Ruth Barnett and her four associates here Tuesday on charges of maintaining a public nuisance.

A Portland circuit court jury of six women and six men returned a guilty verdict Friday after a two-week trial in which the state contended the defendants operated a place where abortions could be obtained.

Along with Dr. Barnett, Dr. and Mrs. H. G. Weigler, Mary Kinsey and Billy Hillman face a maximum fine of \$200 each and six months in jail.

The four were arrested last summer in a city-wide raid on suspected abortion nests.
