Science at Work

New York — (U.P.) — The plastic swimming pool is growing up. Time was when these plastic pools were only for children to be used as wading pools.

Science now has a pool that is 27 feet long and 13 feet wide. It has a depth range of three to five feet—deep enough for diving. As many as 15 persons can be in the pool without being overcrowded.

The pool, made of vinylite plastic sheeting, was developed by Bilnor Corp., Maspeth, Long Island, N. Y., and will cost only a few hundred dollars as compared to the several thousands usually spent for a pool of the same size and made of concrete or tile.

Material Resistant To Acids, Salt

The plastic material is resistant to chemicals or salt water. Freezing does not damage it so the pool can be left out during the winter months. The pool holds more than 10,000 gallons of water which can be drained either by a drainage system or by a pump, the engineers say. The pool is cleaned by ordinary soap and water. Chemicals are used for purification of water.

The pool, the engineers say, can be installed in sandy or loam types of soil. It is recommended that the sides of the excavation be reinforced with lumber such as roofing boards, sheathing or plywood.

Pool Maintenance Easy, Low Cost

In addition to the low initial cost, the pool may be maintained

reasonably, the engineers say

For instance, there are no costs as scraping, re-painting and so forth. Once installed the pool is in on a permanent basis.

The pool has several pieces of optional equipment. One is a pool liner. Others are an inflatable bumper to prevent excessive water from splashing beyond the pool area, and a cover of plastic material designed to protect the pool when not in use. The cover also serves to keep pets, leaves and debris from the pool.

The combined weight of the accessories is less than 300 pounds. The engineers say you can install the pool yourself. You dig your own hole for the pool.

TENSION AND THE CORONARIES

Webster says tension is "mental strain; intensity of feeling or effort." In the medical sense it is "unrest and striving due to inner physiological causes," whatever "inner physiological causes" may mean. Some of Webster's definitions remind me of the fearful and wonderful forms everybody has to fill out for the Hydra-headed tax bureau or department of government.

Probably the most hackneyed expressions in use are from people who ask for medical advice, which quack though I may be, I cannot give without having examined the patient, are (1) "You have helped others—maybe you can help me" and (2) "The doctors around here"—the home doctors seem to lack that aura of eminence which surrounds doctors far away—in which category, for the moment, I belong.

Now it is not like that on the bowling green. There the loafers know me too well, and so my opinion or advice on any matter pertaining to health or illness counts for little against the view of any doctor they don't know so well.

This would not bother me at all, were it not for the effect of tension on the coronary arteries and the supply of oxygen to the heart muscle.

Some of the best bowlers on the greens have had one or more bouts of coronary occlusion (thrombosis). As a general rule a game of bowls every day or two is fine medicine for them, and invariably, so far as my observation goes, they benefit in every way from playing the game regularly.

But, blankety-blank 'em, they get overenthusiastic and enter tournaments, prize contests and the like, despite my entreaty, and spoil my fun for the day.

Any one who has ever played any kind of game just for the fun of it and then played in a contest or tournament, especially with spectators or a gallery, knows what tension means.

If the coronary arteries (the small arteries that deliver freshly oxygenated blood directly to the heart muscle) are at all narrowed or thickened or hardened or functionally impaired, they are more likely to contract or tighten up under such circumstance and through the constricted vessel of course less blood will flow and the heart muscle

will receive insufficient oxygen to — well, that's enough to say about it.

Two of the birds who have recently engaged in tournament or trophy games of bowls have experienced unpleasant after-effects.

But we live and learn, or sometimes we don't.

What I say about tension and the coronaries applies not only to lawn bowling but also to golf, fishing, shooting, baseball or any other game or physical activity which may be good for the man or woman with heart trouble.
